Late auditions may be arranged by special request, provided there is room in the respective instructor's studio.

Students wishing to be considered for Music Scholarships must submit the audition and admission applications no later than February 15. Students applying after this date will be scheduled to audition on the Scholarship Days only if the schedule permits. Music Scholarships will normally be awarded on the basis of auditions performed on the March auditions only.

BA (Major in Music) applicants are not required to audition, but must complete the written theory and ear tests, preferably on one of the Audition days listed on the front cover. They will perform an audition only if they wish to take Applied Music as an elective in their program. Such instruction will be approved only if faculty time permits.

Students interested in arranging a pre-audition visit to the campus to meet the faculty, see the facility, experience a private lesson on their instrument/voice, attend a day of classes, or simply to ask questions are encouraged to contact Susan by email : <u>music@upei.ca</u> or phone 902-566-0507.

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Why Study Music at UPEI?

Small Classes – The small class sizes in the UPEI Music Department make for a great faculty-student ratio, allowing faculty members to get to know each student and to provide the individual attention that fosters both academic and personal growth.

UPEI offers three music programs, each designed to prepare the student for a professional music career.

- Bachelor of Music A four-year program (120 semester hours) designed for students wishing a strong foundation in Music History, Performance, or Theory/Composition and for those intending to pursue a career as a performing artist, theorist/composer, or musicologist. Years I and II are common to the Music Education program.
- Bachelor of Music Education A five-year program (150 semester hours) designed to qualify graduates for the teaching of music as specialists in elementary and secondary school music. Upon the completion of this program, a student will qualify for a Prince Edward Island Teaching Certificate 5. Bachelor of Music Education students who wish to specialize in grades K-6 are advised, when choosing arts or science electives, to select from a variety of areas. Bachelor of Music Education students who wish to specialize in grades 7-12 are advised, when choosing arts or science electives, to elect an area in which they are prepared to continue at least to the 300 level, to provide them with a second teaching area.
- Bachelor of Arts (Music) A four-year program (120 semester hours) designed for those who wish to study music in a more general Arts curriculum. As a general program, it will not prepare students for teaching music, but will prepare them for further study toward careers such as music librarian, musicology, music publishing, communications media, and sound recording.

ADMISSION

Visit Us - Students are encouraged to make arrangements to come to campus for a half-day to meet with some of our faculty, view our facilities and campus, and receive clarification on any questions they may have.

How to Apply

The recommended deadline is February 1. All documentation must be complete by August 15 (February 1 for scholarship candidates).

- Submit directly to the Registrar's Office:
 - Create a UPEI Account by filling out the form found in the following link: http://www.upei.ca/becomeastudent/ Note: you will have the option of selecting Bachelor of Arts Major in Music or Bachelor of Music
 - By selecting either the BA in Music or the Bachelor of Music, you will be directed to complete an application that includes an application for audition.
 - If interested in the Bachelor of Music Education degree, you must make formal application after your second full year in the Bachelor of Music program.
 - Submit application fee (\$50.00) using a credit card or in person with cash, cheque or money order (made out to UPEI) at the UPEI Accounting Office.
 - Have official transcripts forwarded from any high school, college, or university attended.
 - Applications will be acknowledged upon receipt, and the audition day confirmed. The schedule for the various components of the Audition Procedures will be forwarded approximately two weeks in advance of the actual audition date. Please see pages 5-9 for details about the audition and how to prepare.
 - Audition results, as well as admission to UPEI, will be communicated to the applicant by the University Admissions Office. Please note that acceptance to both the Music Department and the University is required.

Students who wish to do so are encouraged to include a résumé with their application package.

Residence

Residence information may be obtained from the Residence Manager, UPEI, 550 University Avenue, Charlottetown, PEI C1A 4P3, or from the residence web site at: <u>upei.ca/residence/</u>.

General Requirements for University Admission

The following general University admission requirements have been established as a guide to applicants and the Admissions Committee. Possession of these minimum requirements does not establish the right of an applicant to be admitted. The University reserves the right to reject or accept any applicant.

- 70% minimum cumulative: English, one language or Social Studies, three Grade 12 academic courses from any subject area.
- Exceptional students from Grade XI may be considered for admission.

Music Requirements

Applicants must meet the following music requirements in addition to the general entrance requirements of the University as noted above:

- Each student seeking admission to the BMus or BMusEd program must audition on an instrument or voice, showing proficiency in performance, technique and sight-reading at the Grade 6 conservatory level. Refer to pp 6-8 for information pertaining to the repertoire and technique required. The audition itself can be done informally (one-on-one with the appropriate applied professor) on a date that is suitable to the student and professor. Students seeking scholarship will be required to undergo the more formal audition procedure with three members of the music faculty as adjudicators (March audition dates). [see page 6 for further details].
- Students seeking admission to any Music program must undergo theory and ear testing to determine skill level (see page 2 for details).

Scholarships

Each year the Scholarship Committee awards numerous University Entrance and Tuition Scholarships to those attaining high academic standing in high school. PEI Students must make application through the Registrar's Office by the end of February for such scholarships. Out of Province Students are automatically considered for these scholarships, and no separate application process is necessary. However, students from outside the Province should apply for admission to UPEI before the end of February. For more information visit the web site at

Admissible applicants who demonstrate exceptional promise as performers may qualify for music scholarships. No additional application form is required in order to be considered for these scholarships. (Note the application deadlines and scholarship audition dates on the front cover). Numerous in-course music awards ranging in value up to \$1,500 are available to students proceeding to their second, third, fourth and fifth year of study.

THE AUDITION

Components of the Audition Procedures for scholarship hopefuls

- Formal Audition The audition will normally be performed in the Dr Steel Recital Hall before a few of the full-time music faculty (3 people maximum). Applicants should be prepared to perform 10-15 minutes of music. Faculty reserve the right to stop the auditionee in the middle of a piece, after hearing a sufficient portion of the composition. During the audition the student will:
 - perform the audition pieces selected (refer to pp 6-8 for information on repertoire requirements);
 - o play scales, arpeggios, chords, or other technique as requested;
 - sight-read;
 - have an informal interview with faculty concerning music background, academic plans, and career goals.

Informal Audition Procedures for students not seeking scholarships

 Informal Audition – the UPEI Music Department is now offering an alternative to the formal audition. Students wishing to audition early; or those waiting until June or August to audition may opt for an informal audition. An informal audition would involve a lesson or two with an applied instructor. The instructor would determine the student's eligibility for that applied studio. If the student has an informal audition prior to March 2022, and is accepted into the studio, but then wishes to apply for scholarship, he/she would then do a formal audition (see procedure outlined above). To arrange an informal audition, please email music@upei.ca. • **Theory Test** - Students will write a simple diagnostic theory entrance test, giving the professor insight into the knowledge that incoming first-year students possess. There will be 30 minutes allotted for the test, after which the professor will be in contact with you regarding the results and any helpful recommendations.

For more information about the test or the UPEI Music Theory Booster Camp offered each year in August, please contact the department.

- Ear Test Individual diagnostic ear tests will take approximately 15 minutes and will consist of:
 - singing given melodies at sight;
 - singing melodies first played on piano;
 - clapping rhythms at sight;
 - identifying, by ear, types of intervals and triads played on piano (e.g. perfect 4th, minor 3rd, major triad, diminished triad).

Note: Applicants for the BA (Major in Music) Program must take the theory and ear tests, but are not required to perform an audition unless they wish to take Applied Music as a music elective. Such instruction will be approved only if faculty time permits.

Collaborative Pianists

Where applicable, instrumentalists and singers are asked to bring their own accompanists. If this is not possible, copies of the music to be used in the audition should be forwarded (by regular mail or email) with the application forms, and the Music Department will arrange to have an accompanist available at a cost to the auditionee of \$30.00. Taped accompaniments are not acceptable.

Audition Requirements

The repertoire chosen for the performance audition should contrast in style, mood, and era of composition. An excellent source of appropriate repertoire suggestions is the Royal Conservatory of Music syllabus for each instrument/ voice. A copy can be purchased for a nominal amount from the Frederick Harris Music Co. (www.frederickharrismusic.com - click on Canada - scroll to bottom of page - click on Choose Publication). Alternatively, contact the music department (<u>music@upei.ca</u>) for suggestions.

Piano Auditions

a) A minimum of 3 contrasting pieces for solo piano. The suggested minimum difficulty level is equivalent to RCM Grade 6. Performance from memory is strongly encouraged.

b) Scales, arpeggios and chords for all major and minor scales up to 4 sharps/4 flats.

c) Sight-reading

Memorization of audition pieces is encouraged, but not mandatory.

Organ

Applicants wishing to major in organ may audition on piano (see above) or on organ as follows:

(a) J.S. Bach - one of the Chorale Preludes from Orgelbüchlein or one of the Eight Short Preludes and Fugues

(b) One piece from the Romantic or Modern Eras

(c) One piece from the Baroque Era by a composer other than JS Bach.

Brass, Woodwind, and Percussion Auditions

(a) Two pieces of contrasting style and period, to be played with accompaniment (Level - Grade 6 RCM or equivalent)

- (b) Technical study
- (c) Major, minor and chromatic scales
- (d) Sight-reading

Percussionists

Material prepared should include pieces for mallets, snare drum, and timpani, as well as snare drum rudiments.

Vocal Auditions

(a) Two songs of contrasting style and period, to be sung with

accompaniment (one to be sung in a language other than English)

- (b) Sight-singing
- (c) Technical Exercises singing specific intervals upon request

Classical Guitar Auditions

- (a) Two classical guitar works in contrasting style that display the candidate's technical ability and musicianship. It is better to choose easier pieces and play them well (e.g., easier pieces by Aguado, Bach, Brouwer, Carcassi, Giuliani, Milan, Ponce, Sanz, Sor, Tarrega).
- (b) Sight-reading

Classical Strings Auditions

- (a) Two classical works in contrasting style that display the candidate's technical ability and musicianship
- (b) Sight-reading

Jazz Guitar & Bass Auditions

- (a) Two jazz guitar works in contrasting style that display the candidate's technical ability and musicianship.
- (b) Sight-reading

More detailed suggestions and guidelines will be made available upon request.

Recorded Auditions

Recorded Auditions

In response to health and safety concerns during the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, applicants to the B.Mus. program may submit an audition recording in place of an in-person audition.

- 1. To be considered for music scholarships, recordings and all supporting application materials must be submitted no later than the second official audition date, **March 19, 2022.**.
- 2. Prior to submitting your audition recording:
 - Please ensure that you have completed and submitted an Audition Application form (you will be directed to this form when selecting a music program during your UPEI application through the Registrar's Office, as outlined on Page 3 of this booklet).
 - Diagnostic theory and ear assessments must be supervised by a music teacher. Please submit their name and contact information to the Audition Coordinator at <u>music@upei.ca</u>, and await formal instructions.
- 3. Recording Instructions:
 - Before you begin, record a sound check to make sure that the audio quality is clear and that you appear clearly in the frame; we expect that you will use recording equipment that is available to you – a quality recording using your phone is fine.
 - Each individual piece should be recorded in a single, unedited take so that we can hear and see a continuous performance of each work; you may pause your video between pieces, but do not otherwise edit your recording.

- Applicants are encouraged to perform their audition with an in-person pianist. If this is not possible, a pre-recorded track will be acceptable.
- Upload your video to YouTube and make sure that privacy settings are set to "unlisted." Label your video UPEI Audition_Your Name_Date.
- 4. Email the link to your YouTube video to music@upei.ca.

PREPARING FOR THE AUDITION

Preparing to Study Music at UPEI

Each student comes to UPEI with a unique background and set of experiences. You may find that, in certain areas, your knowledge and skills are already quite advanced, while in others, you have only just begun to learn the fundamentals. At UPEI, we want to help you to develop not only professional-level performance skills, but also skills and knowledge essential to becoming a well-rounded musician. You can help yourself get a good start by investing some time now, preparing to study before you come to UPEI. By working systematically toward strengthening all of your musical skills, you will establish a pattern that will significantly improve your chances of success in your chosen program.

Performance Skills

Strong performance skills are essential to the success of any musician. If you are planning to register for a B.Mus. program, your applied study (that is, your instrument or voice) will form one of the most important components of your degree program. In order to ensure that your audition is the best possible, consider committing to a regular daily practice schedule of at least an hour each day (preferably more). Work carefully, not only at the repertoire you intend to perform, but also at the technical aspects of the audition (for example, scales and arpeggios) and developing a good sound with your instrument. If you are not currently studying with a private teacher, and you are concerned about your ability to perform adequately for the audition, you might wish to consider taking some private lessons. In addition to helping you focus better on your preparations, a private instructor can help you troubleshoot specific problem areas, such as technique or musical interpretation.

Sight-reading forms an additional element of the audition. You can prepare for this by setting aside regular times for reading through unfamiliar repertoire. It doesn't really matter what the music is as long as you are practicing reading. As you develop greater proficiency and confidence in sight-reading, you will find it easier to learn new repertoire, since the first step--reading unfamiliar music--will be less daunting.

Music Theory Skills

The theory entrance test is a diagnostic test that will inform the professor about the level of previous instruction received by the incoming students. To prepare for theory classes and ensure success, students can prepare by studying the rudimentary concepts on their own time, through a local instructor, or by attending the UPEI Music Theory Camp, offered each year in August. MUSIC PROGRAMS

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

Students in a Bachelor of Music Program are advised, on choosing an arts or science elective, to elect an area in which they are prepared to continue to at least the 3000 level.

Bachelor of Music Program

The Bachelor of Music Program (120 semester hours) is designed to provide students with sufficient flexibility to reflect their interests. The first two years are common to the Music Education Program. During years three and four, students may focus on Theory, History, or Applied Music. Upon graduation, students may wish to continue studies at the graduate level in Theory and Composition, Music History, or Performance. Graduation with a Bachelor of Music will not qualify a student for music teacher certification on Prince Edward Island.

Bachelor of Music Education Program

The Bachelor of Music Education Program is a five-year program (150 semester hours) designed to qualify graduates for the teaching of music as specialists in elementary and secondary school music. Upon the completion of this program, a student will qualify for a Prince Edward Island Teaching Certificate 5. Bachelor of Music Education students who wish to specialize in grades K-6 are advised, when choosing arts or science electives, to select from a variety of areas. Bachelor of Music Education students who wish to specialize in grades 7-12 are advised, when choosing arts or science electives, to elect an area in which they are prepared to continue at least to the 3000 level, to provide them with a second teaching area.

Bachelor of Arts - Major in Music

The sole prerequisite for entrance into the BA program (120 semester hours) is the successful completion of the Diagnostic Theory Entrance Test; the Aural Skills test and an interview with music faculty. The program is designed for students who wish to study music in a more general Arts Curriculum. Applied Music is not a mandatory requirement in this program. It is strongly recommended that the student have some music background.

Music Minor

Students wishing to receive a Minor in Music must complete a total of twenty-one semester hours of music courses, selected from the following list (or others in consultation with the Chair), with at least nine semester hours at the 2000 level or above: Music 1130, 1140, 1150, 1170,1230, 1240, 2130, 2140, 2150, 2170, 2230, 3150, 4120, 4220, or 4230.

Students interested in the Minor in Music are encouraged to contact the Music Department for course advisement. Those students wishing to register for Music 1130 (Music Theory) must write a diagnostic theory test to determine the level of learning support that might be needed prior

to (or during) the course. These students should contact the Music Department before 10 July to arrange an appropriate time to write this test.

Courses for non-music majors

Non-music majors are permitted to enroll in music courses provided they make arrangements to take the necessary entrance tests. Students wishing to take music courses should contact the music office (music@upei.ca or 566-0507).

BACHELOR OF MUSIC PROGRAMS

NOTE: To fulfill graduation requirements, all students must successfully complete:

- 1) **ONE** of the following three courses:
 - **UPEI 1010** Writing Studies: Engaging Writing, Rhetoric, and Communication (equivalent to English 1010)
 - UPEI 1020 Inquiry Studies: Engaging Ideas and Cultural Contexts (equivalent to Global Issues 1510); or
 - **c. UPEI 1030 –** University Studies: Engaging University Contexts and Experiences (previously known as University 1030).

AND

2) One *writing intensive* course of three (3) credit hours (a list of writing intensive courses can be found under Current Students on the Music Department website: music.upei.ca).

Completion of UPEI 1010, 1020 or 1030 is strongly recommended before taking any music courses beyond the 100 level. The Music Department strongly recommends UPEI 101 be taken as the required course.

ENSEMBLE REQUIREMENTS: All students enrolled in a Bachelor of Music program are required to satisfactorily complete the requirements for participation in a minimum of six full-year ensembles for the degree as follows:

- brass, woodwind & percussion majors 2 years Concert Choir and 4 years Wind Symphony
- piano majors 4 years Concert Choir and 2 years Collaborative Piano (or serving as a pianist in a large ensemble)
- voice majors 4 years Concert Choir; 2 years Diction Lab & 2 years of Chamber Singers.
- Guitar majors (Jazz & Classical) 2 years Concert Choir and 4 years of another recognized ensemble
- String majors 2 years Concert Choir and 4 years of another recognized ensemble

Placement is at the discretion of faculty.

Unless the ensemble requirement is fulfilled, graduation will be denied.

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

1050 **STUDIO MINOR**: This course will not be counted toward the credits required for Music degrees. The course will be open to students not in the music program, contingent upon a satisfactory audition. In all cases, the Studio Minor will be offered subject to the individual professors having the necessary time available. This course may entail a one-half-hour lesson per week over two semesters, or a one-hour lesson per week in one semester.

- 1130 THEORY: This course briefly reviews the basic rudiments of music theory and introduces the principles of diatonic harmony.
 3 hours credit
 PREREQUISITE: Music student or by permission of the instructor.
- 1140 **THEORY**: This course is a continuation of Music 113 3 hours credit PREREQUISITE: Music 1130
- 1150 **AURAL SKILLS I**: This course is designed to nurture the basic musicianship skills required to recognize music aurally and either to transcribe it into written notation or to sing it at sight. Meter, rhythm patterns, contour, key relationships, and intervals are examined to improve dictation skills; and the moveable doh system with hand-signs is used to improve score reading skills, musical memory, and inner hearing. NOTE: A passing grade must be achieved in both Sight Singing and Dictation skills. 3 hours credit PREREQUISITE: Music student or by permission of the instructor.
- 1170 **AURAL SKILLS II:** This course is a continuation of Music 115. Prerequisite: Music 1150. 3 hr credit
- 1230 INTRODUCTION TO MUSIC & CULTURE: This course prepares students to study music as a product of cultural expression through an examination of how diverse socio-cultural, economic, and political forces shape the production, transmission, and reception of music. Through the exploration of diverse repertoire from a variety of music cultures and historical periods, students develop foundational skills in critical listening, research, and writing within the discipline. 3 hours credit Note: A basic ability to read music is recommended
- 1240 **PERSPECTIVES IN MUSIC & CULTURE I**: This course provides a topical exploration of Western Art music and other musical traditions through a variety of cultural, historical, and theoretical lenses. Students examine the complex relationships that exist among music and concepts of identity, power, ideology and belief, conflict and crisis, technology, commerce, and visual culture. Topics will vary each year.

PREREQUISITE: Music 1230 3 hours credit

- APPLIED STRINGS I: Individual instruction is given on Cello, Double Bass, Jazz Guitar, Classical Guitar, Viola or Violin.
 3 hours credit.
 PREREQUISITE: A successful audition; Co-requisite: Music 1330 and Music 1270 OR Music 1770.
- 1512 **APPLIED STRINGS II:** This is a continuation of Music 1511. PREREQUISITE: Music 1511 / 3 hours credit / Co-requisite: Music 1340 and Music 1280 OR Music 1780.

- APPLIED ORGAN I: Individual instruction is given on Organ 3 hours credit.
 PREREQUISITE: A successful audition; Co-requisite: Music 1330
- 1612 **APPLIED ORGAN II:** This is a continuation of Music 1611. PREREQUISITE: Music 1611 / 3 hours credit / Co-requisite: Music 1340
- 2050 **STUDIO MINOR**: This course is a continuation of Music 1050. 3 hours credit PREREQUISITE: Music 1050
- 2130 THEORY: This course introduces the elements of chromatic harmony and modulation.
 3 hours credit
 PREREQUISITE: Music 1140
- 2140 THEORY: This is a continuation of Music 2130.
 3 hours credit
 PREREQUISITE: Music 2130
- AURAL SKILLS III: This course is a continuation of Music 1170.
 3 hours credit PREREQUISITE: Music 1170.
 NOTE: A passing grade must be achieved in both Sight Singing and Dictation skills.
- 2170 **AURAL SKILLS IV:** This course is a continuation of Music 2150. Prerequisite: Music 2150. 3 hr credit
- 2230 **PERSPECTIVES IN MUSIC & CULTURE II**: This course examines aspects of Western Art music from the eighteenth century to the present through a variety of cultural, historical, and theoretical lenses. Topics will vary each year. PREREQUISITE: Music 1240 3 hours credit
- APPLIED WOODWIND, BRASS, PERCUSSION III: Individual instruction is given on all standard orchestral and band instruments including Bassoon, Clarinet, Euphonium, Flute, Horn, Saxophone, Trombone, Trumpet, Oboe, Tuba or Percussion. 3 hours credit.
 PREREQUISITE: Music 1212; Co-requisite: Music 2330 and Music 2370

- 2212 APPLIED WOODWIND, BRASS, PERCUSSION IV: This is a continuation of Music 2211. PREREQUISITE: Music 2211 / 3 hours credit; Co-requisite: Music 2340 and Music 2380
- APPLIED VOICE III: Individual instruction is given in Voice 3 hours credit.
 PREREQUISITE: Music 1312; Co-requisite: Music 2330 and Music 2270
- 2312 **APPLIED VOICE IV:** This is a continuation of Music 2311. PREREQUISITE: Music 2311 / 3 hours credit / Co-requisite: Music 2340 and Music 2280.

- 2612 **APPLIED ORGAN IV:** This is a continuation of Music 2611. PREREQUISITE: Music 2611 / 3 hours credit / Co-requisite: Music 2340
- 2450 **PERCUSSION TECHNIQUES**: This course provides group instruction in percussion instruments, including snare drum, tympani, and mallet instruments and introduces materials and procedures used in teaching them. 2 hours credit

- 2460 **PERCUSSION TECHNIQUES**: This course is a continuation of Music 2450. 2 hours credit PREREQUISITE: Music 2450
- 3050 **STUDIO MINOR**: This course is a continuation of Music 2050. 3 hours credit. PREREQUISITE: Music 2050
- 3110 **SPECIAL TOPICS IN MUSIC THEORY**: PREREQUISITES: Music 2140 and permission of the instructor.
- 3150 COMPOSITION: This course is an introductory course in composition which includes analysis of contemporary works. Students write compositions in smaller forms and structures for voices and instruments.
 3 hours credit PREREQUISITE: Permission of instructor
- FORM AND ANALYSIS: This course involves the detailed analysis and study of works, large and small forms, representing a variety of structures from 1650 to the present.
 3 hours credit / PREREQUISITE: Permission of instructor
- 3180 **FORM AND ANALYSIS**: This course is a continuation of Music 3170. PREREQUISITE: Music 3170 / 3 hours credit
- 3190 **ADVANCED TOPICS IN THEORY**: This course allows advanced study in a particular area of music theory for students who possess a special expertise or interest in one facet of the discipline. Written application must be made to the Chair of the Department. PREREQUISITE: Restricted to 3rd-, 4th-, and 5th-year Music majors. 3 hours credit
- 3210 **SPECIAL TOPICS IN MUSIC HISTORY**: PREREQUISITE: Music 2140 and 2230.
- 3220 **POPULAR MUSIC** (Not offered every year): This course explores the range of North American and British popular music from the early 1950s to the present, with an emphasis on rock music. Students examine selected repertoire while exploring relevant critical methodologies used in the study of popular music. PREREQUISITE: Music 2140 and 2230. 3 hours credit

3250 **STUDIES IN FILM MUSIC** (Not offered every year): This course introduces students to the ways in which music contributes to the cinematic experience. Through a series of case studies involving analysis of videos and accompanying musical scores, students explore the techniques of film music composition and develop the analytical skills necessary to consider music in a multi-media context.

3 hours credit // PREREQUISITE: Music 2140, 2170, 2230

3260 **MUSICAL THEATRE** (Not offered every year): This course explores the development of the Broadway musical from the early 1940s to the present. Students examine selected repertoire while exploring relevant critical methodologies used in the study of the genre.

PREREQUISITE: Music 2140 and 2230. 3 hours credit

3290 **ADVANCED TOPICS IN MUSIC HISTORY**: This course allows advanced study in a particular area of music history for students who possess a special expertise or interest in one facet of the discipline. Written application must be made to the Chair of the Department.

PREREQUISITE: Restricted to 3rd-, 4th-, and 5th-year Music majors // 3 hours credit

- 3211 APPLIED WOODWIND, BRASS, PERCUSSION V: Individual instruction is given on all standard orchestral and band instruments including Bassoon, Clarinet, Euphonium, Flute, Horn, Saxophone, Trombone, Trumpet, Oboe, Tuba or Percussion.
 3 hours credit.
 PREREQUISITE: Music 2212; Co-requisite: Music 3660
- 3212 APPLIED WOODWIND, BRASS, PERCUSSION VI: This is a continuation of Music 3211. PREREQUISITE: Music 3211 / 3 hours credit; Co-requisite: Music 3670
- 3215 **Business of Music:** This is a practical course intended to introduce students to the skills and tools needed to build a successful career in music. 3 hour credit. Requisites: Music 2130, Music 2150, Music 2230
- 3311 APPLIED VOICE V: Individual instruction is given in Voice 3 hours credit. PREREQUISITE: Music 2312; Co-requisite: Music 3550 and Music 1051

- 3312 APPLIED VOICE VI: This is a continuation of Music 3311.
 PREREQUISITE: Music 3311 / 3 hours credit / Co-requisite: Music 3560 and Music 1052
- 3411 APPLIED PIANO V: Individual instruction is given on piano.
 3 hours credit.
 PREREQUISITE: Music 2412, Co-requisite: Music 3550 and Music 1250
- 3412 **APPLIED PIANO VI:** This is a continuation of Music 3411. PREREQUISITE: Music 3411 / 3 hours credit /Co-Requisite: Music 3560 and Music 1260
- 3511 APPLIED STRINGS V: Individual instruction is given on Cello, Double Bass, Jazz Guitar, Classical Guitar, Viola or Violin.
 3 hours credit.
 PREREQUISITE: Music 2512; Co-requisite: Music 3660 OR Music 3770.
- 3512 **APPLIED STRINGS VI:** This is a continuation of Music 3511. PREREQUISITE: Music 3511 / 3 hours credit / Co-requisite: Music 3670 OR Music 3780.
- 3611 APPLIED ORGAN V: Individual instruction is given on Organ 3 hours credit.
 PREREQUISITE: Music 2612; Co-requisite: Music 3550 and Music 1770.
- 3612 **APPLIED ORGAN VI:** This is a continuation of Music 3611. PREREQUISITE: Music 3611 / 3 hours credit / Co-requisite: Music 3560 and Music 1780.
- 3351/ CHAMBER MUSIC I: This course develops chamber music performance skills and competencies through the study of music for the genre selected. Ensembles are formed before the academic year. Each ensemble meets for two hours each week, one of which is with instruction. Public performances are encouraged, and at least two must be presented in order to complete the course satisfactorily.

1.5 hours credits per semester

PREREQUISITE: Permission of the instructor

- 3360 **RECITAL PERFORMANCE I**: This course is open to students who wish to pursue a higher concentration in performance. Students are required to present a public recital consisting of a minimum of 30 minutes of music. 1 hour credit PREREQUISITE: 80% average in Music 231..-232.. and 70% average in Music courses in the previous academic year
- 3370 **SPECIAL TOPICS IN APPLIED MUSIC**: Restricted to 3rd, 4th and 5th year music majors, or permission of the instructor.
- 3380 **DIRECTED STUDIES IN APPLIED MUSIC**: This course allows advanced study in a particular area of applied music for students who possess a special expertise or interest in one facet of the discipline. Written application must be made to the Chair of the Department.

PREREQUISITE: Restricted to 3rd-, 4th-, and 5th-year Music majors

3 hours credit

- **NOTE:** See Academic Regulation 9 for Regulations Governing Directed Studies
- 3390 **DIRECTED STUDIES IN APPLIED MUSIC**: This course allows advanced study in a particular area of applied music for students who possess a special expertise or interest in one facet of the discipline. Written application must be made to the Chair of the Department.

PREREQUISITE: Restricted to 3rd-, 4th-, and 5th-year Music majors. 3 hours credit

NOTE: See Academic Regulation 9 for Regulations Governing Directed Studies

- 3410 **SPECIAL TOPICS IN MUSIC EDUCATION**: Restricted to 3rd, 4th and 5th year music majors.
- 3430 **CHORAL TECHNIQUES**: Instruction is given in the principles of vocal production, basic functional choral techniques, and choral conducting. Repertoire from the sixteen century to the present will be selected in order to facilitate development in both singing and conducting techniques. Three main activities of this course include: sight singing at an advanced level, group and solo singing, and choral conducting. PREREQUISITE: Music 1170 and at least one year of UPEI Concert Choir. Non-music majors must have some choral/singing background, or pass a vocal and aural skills audition. 2 hours credit

- 3440 CHORAL TECHNIQUES*: This course provides a continuation of Music 3430, with more demanding repertoire. It concentrates on changing tempo, changing meter, and cueing problems. PREREQUISITE: Music 3430. 2 hours credit
- 3450 **WOODWIND TECHNIQUES**: This course provides group instruction in clarinet, saxophone, flute, oboe, and bassoon. Students familiarize themselves with materials used in teaching these instruments. 2 hours credit
- 3460 **WOODWIND TECHNIQUES**: This course is a continuation of Music 3450. 2 hours credit / PREREQUISITE: Music 3450
- 3470 **STRING TECHNIQUES:** This course provides group instruction in orchestral string instruments. It focuses on materials and procedures used in teaching these instruments. 2 hours credit.
- 3480 **STRING TECHNIQUES:** This course is a continuation of Music 3470. 2 hours credit/ PREREQUISITE: Music 3470.
- 3530 **ELEMENTARY MUSIC EDUCATION** (Offered in alternating years): This course examines four major approaches to teaching elementary school music Dalcroze, Kodaly, Orff and Comprehensive Musicianship. Students interrogate curriculum expectations and repertoire choices and they develop pedagogical skills, focusing on the young child, Grades K 3. PREREQUISITE: Music 1170. 2 hours credit.
- 3540 **ELEMENTARY MUSIC EDUCATION** (Offered in alternating years): The investigations begun in Music 3530 are continued in Music 3540, focusing on children in Grades 4-6. Learning theories as they relate to music are examined. Prerequisite: Music 3530. 2 hours credit.
- 3590 **ADVANCED TOPICS IN MUSIC EDUCATION**: This course allows advanced study in a particular area of music education for students who possess a special expertise or interest in one facet of the discipline. Written application must be made to the Chair of the Department. Prerequisite: upper year students, 3 credits.
- 4050 **STUDIO MINOR**: This course is a continuation of Music 3050. 3 hours credit PREREQUISITE: Music 3050

- 4110 **SPECIAL TOPICS IN MUSIC THEORY**: PREREQUISITES: Music 2140 and permission of the instructor
- 4120 MUSIC COGNITION: This course focuses on the mental processes underlying music perception, performance and composition. Following a discussion of basic hearing mechanisms, students examine research on perception of music elements (e.g. tone, interval, triad, harmony and rhythm) and then proceed to broader issues (e.g. musical memory, meaning, aesthetics and intelligence). Music cognition is also compared to other kinds of cognition. Students conduct experimental research. Cross listed with Psychology 4120 (cf Psychology 4120)

3 hours credit PREREQUISITE: Psychology 1010-1020, 2710-2720, or permission of instructor

- 4150 COMPOSITION: This course provides instruction in the composition of works in larger forms for solo instruments, chamber ensembles, and large ensembles. Students are expected to complete several works.
 3 hours credit PREREQUISITE: Music 3150
- 4190 **ADVANCED TOPICS IN MUSIC THEORY**: This course allows advanced study in a particular area of music theory for students who possess a special expertise or interest in one facet of the discipline. Written application must be made to the Chair of the Department. PREREQUISITE: Restricted to 3rd-, 4th-, and 5th-Year Music majors // 3 hours credit
- 4210 SPECIAL TOPICS IN MUSIC HISTORY: PREREQUISITES: Music 2140 and 2230
- 4230 CANADIAN MUSIC I: This course introduces the music of Canada from the colonial era to the end of World War I, within the context of the socio-cultural, political, and economic history of the country.
 3 hours credit PREREQUISITE: Music 2230
- 4240 **CANADIAN MUSIC II**: This course introduces the music of Canada from the end of World War I to the present, within the context of the socio-cultural, political, and economic history of the country. 3 hours credit PREREQUISITE: Music 4230

 4281/ INQUIRY METHODS: This course introduces students to the
 skills and methods of inquiry in music history, music theory, and music education. Each student conducts an independent research project. Class time is devoted to discussion of works-inprogress and to research strategies and tools.
 PREREQUISITE: Music 214 and Music 224, plus permission of the instructor. 1.5 hours credit per semester

4290 **ADVANCED TOPICS IN MUSIC HISTORY**: This course allows advanced study in a particular area of music history for students who possess a special expertise or interest in one facet of the discipline. Written application must be made to the Chair of the Department. PREREQUISITE: Restricted to 3rd-, 4th-, and 5th-year Music majors

3 hours credit

- 4211 APPLIED WOODWIND, BRASS, PERCUSSION VII: Individual instruction is given on all standard orchestral and band instruments including Bassoon, Clarinet, Euphonium, Flute, Horn, Saxophone, Trombone, Trumpet, Oboe, Tuba or Percussion.
 3 hours credit.
 PREREQUISITE: Music 3212; Co-requisite: Music 4510
- 4212 APPLIED WOODWIND, BRASS, PERCUSSION VIII: This is a continuation of Music 4211. PREREQUISITE: Music 4211 / 3 hours credit; Co-requisite: Music 4520.
- 4311 APPLIED VOICE VII: Individual instruction is given in Voice 3 hours credit.
 PREREQUISITE: Music 3312; Co-requisite: Music 4030 and Music 2051
- 4312 **APPLIED VOICE VIII:** This is a continuation of Music 4311. PREREQUISITE: Music 4311 / 3 hours credit / Co-requisite: Music 4040 and Music 2052
- 4411 APPLIED PIANO VII: Individual instruction is given on piano.
 3 hours credit.
 PREREQUISITE: Music 3412, Co-requisite: Music 4030 and Music 2250

- 4412 **APPLIED PIANO VIII:** This is a continuation of Music 4411. PREREQUISITE: Music 4411 / 3 hours credit /Co-Requisite: Music 4040 and Music 2260.
- 4511 APPLIED STRINGS VII: Individual instruction is given on Cello, Double Bass, Jazz Guitar, Classical Guitar, Viola or Violin. 3 hours credit. PREREQUISITE: Music 3512; Co-requisite: Music 4510 OR Music 3790.
- 4512 **APPLIED STRINGS VIII:** This is a continuation of Music 4511. PREREQUISITE: Music 4511 / 3 hours credit / Co-requisite: Music 4520 OR Music 4770.
- APPLIED ORGAN VII: Individual instruction is given on Organ 4611 3 hours credit. PREREQUISITE: Music 3612; Co-requisite: Music 4030 and Music 2770.
- APPLIED ORGAN VIII: This is a continuation of Music 4611. 4612 PREREQUISITE: Music 4611 / 3 hours credit / Co-requisite: Music 4040 and Music 2780.
- LITERATURE AND PEDAGOGY OF MAJOR INSTRUMENT 4330 **OR VOICE:** Students exam literature in their major field and investigate the teaching problems related to their major instrument or voice. Students teach at least one private student PREREQUISITE: Music 232. for the year. 3 hours credit /
- LITERATURE AND PEDAGOGY OF MAJOR INSTRUMENT 4340 **OR VOICE:** This course is a continuation of Music 4330. 3 hours credit. PREREQUISITE: Music 4330
- 4351/ CHAMBER MUSIC II: This is a continuation of Music 3352 in 4352 which chamber music performance skills are advanced further. Ensembles are formed before the academic year. Each ensemble meets for two hours each week, one of which is with instruction. Public performance is encouraged and at least two must be presented to complete the course satisfactorily. 1.5 hours credit per semester

PREREQUISITE: Music 3352 and permission of the instructor

- 4360 **RECITAL PERFORMANCE II:** This is a continuation of Music 3360. Students are required to present a public recital consisting of a minimum of 50 minutes of music. 2 hours credit PREREQUISITE: Music 3360, 80% average in Music 331..-332..., and 70% average in Music courses in the previous academic year.
- 4370 **SPECIAL TOPICS IN APPLIED MUSIC**: Restricted to 3rd, 4th and 5th year music majors or permission of the instructor.
- 4380 DIRECTED STUDIES IN APPLIED MUSIC: This course is a continuation of Music 432... An emphasis is placed on a high level of performance in the major instrument or voice.
 PREREQUISITE: Music 432... and permission of the Chair. 3 hours credit.

NOTE: See Academic Regulation 9 for Regulations Governing Directed Studies.

4390 **DIRECTED STUDIES IN APPLIED MUSIC**: This course is a continuation of Music 4380. PREREQUISITE: Music 4380 & permission of the Chair. 3 hours credit.

NOTE: See Academic Regulation 9 for Regulations Governing Directed Studies.

- 4410 **SPECIAL TOPICS IN MUSIC EDUCATION**: Restricted to 3rd, 4th and 5th year music majors.
- BRASS TECHNIQUES: This course provides group instruction in trumpet, trombone, French horn, euphonium, and tuba. It focuses on materials and procedures used in teaching these instruments.
 2 hours credit
- 4460 **BRASS TECHNIQUES**: This course is a continuation of Music 445. 2 hours credit. PREREQUISITE: Music 4450
- 4470 **JAZZ TECHNIQUES**: In this course, students examine all of the components of the jazz/stage band and are introduced to the styles, techniques, and special effects needed to develop a school jazz ensemble. 2 hours credit PREREQUISITE: Restricted to 3rd, 4th, and 5th year music majors

- 4530 **SECONDARY MUSIC EDUCATION METHODS**: This course examines music in the junior and senior high schools with emphasis on methods and materials for general music, choral, and instrumental classes. The teaching of musicianship through performance is examined, as is the growing trend toward integrating performance, analysis, and composition in the secondary schools. 2 hours credit. PREREQUISITE: Music 1170
- 4540 SECONDARY MUSIC EDUCATION METHODS: This course is a continuation of Music 4530.
 2 hours credit. PREREQUISITE: Music 4530
- 4550 **CONDUCTING**: This course involves the study of instrumental conducting with an emphasis on techniques and repertoire for the modern wind band. It focuses on basic conducting techniques through more advanced technical problems, as well as rehearsal techniques and score study. 2 hours credit PREREQUISITE: Restricted to 3rd, 4th, and 5th year music majors
- 4560 **CONDUCTING**: This course is a continuation of Music 4550. PREREQUISITE: Music 4550 // 2 hours credit.
- 4590 **ADVANCED TOPICS IN MUSIC EDUCATION**: This course allows advanced study in a particular area of music education for students who possess a special expertise or interest in one facet of the discipline. Written application must be made to the Chair of the Department.

PREREQUISITE: Restricted to 3rd-, 4th-, and 5th-year Music majors. 3 hours credit

4620 **TEACHING INTERNSHIP I**: This course is the first pre-service teaching component of in-school teaching experience for music education students. In school settings, students begin to develop teaching skills, to implement lesson and rehearsal plans, and to consider the role of classroom methods, learning outcomes, and evaluation procedures. Pre-service teaching commences immediately following the April examinations, and continues for six consecutive weeks.

PREREQUISITE: Music 3530-3540 or Music 4530-4540, 75% music average and 70% overall average 20 days of department-approved observation/apprenticeship in schools// 3 hours credit.

4640 TEACHING INTERNSHIP II: This course is the second preservice teaching component of in-school teaching experience for music education students. In school settings, students further develop their teaching skills, lesson planning, rehearsal techniques, and their ability to focus on learning outcomes while becoming reflective practitioners. Pre-service teaching commences immediately following the April examinations, and continues for six consecutive weeks.
 3 hours credit

PREREQUISITE: Music 4620, 75% music average and 70% overall average
