

Operating Budget for the 2019-2020 Fiscal Year



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Message from the President and Vice-Chancellor

The conclusion of the 2018–19 academic year at the University of Prince Edward Island is fast approaching, and, with Convocation around the corner, I am looking forward to celebrating the accomplishments of our students, faculty, and staff.

We are also nearing the end of the fiscal year, signifying the culmination of several months of budget planning, which began with broad consultation with the Vice-Presidents, Deans, and Directors. After gathering information from across campus, we made the best decisions possible to ensure that growth is sustainably managed and the burden of tuition costs on our students is minimized.

As a public institution, UPEI also works very closely with the Government of Prince Edward Island on shared priorities—including the attraction and retention of students from the Island, across Canada, and around the world—in order to develop a sustainable budget for the University. Last year, the Government announced a multi-year funding agreement, allowing us to better plan, and to plan earlier, because of our advance knowledge of the two per cent increase to UPEI's core operating grant. This support reflects the importance of postsecondary education to the future well-being of our province and we remain incredibly grateful for the Government's investment.

Therefore, due to the collaborative efforts of many, I am pleased to present, for the eighth year in a row, a balanced annual operating budget for the 2019–20 fiscal year. The budget document outlines how we will fund the operating expenditures of the University while identifying opportunities to invest in new strategic initiatives that expand our community impact and global reach. We remain true to our ongoing commitment to invest in our future.

Before I discuss these future opportunities, I would like to share some highlights from the past year.

Together, we have made wonderful progress in advancing our mission to provide outstanding experiential and researchdriven learning opportunities for our students.

In 2018, we completed the transformation of Dalton Hall into the Student Experience Hub, an important and key component in serving prospective and current students, and in their successful completion of the enrolment process.

Along with members of the UPEI Strategic Planning Committee, I was energized after we engaged with members of our University community during our strategic plan renewal process, and then unveiled our guiding document, *UPEI Strategic Plan 2018–2023*. We are setting the bar higher and higher, and continue to develop ideas that align with our strategic priorities.

We can be proud of our ongoing gains in enrolment, and that our reputation as a leading university is growing locally, nationally, and around the world. We have welcomed the highest number of international students than ever before, and from more countries. We also have seen increases in the number of students from across Canada.

This growth can largely be attributed to our new programming, including a new Doctor of Psychology, MBA in Global Leadership, and Master in Sustainable Design Engineering. These program developments create ripple effects; for example, with the announcement of our PsyD program, the number of students enrolling in the Bachelor of Arts in Psychology has increased significantly.

To support this enrolment and program growth, UPEI has invested in people. We continue to attract and retain exceptional faculty and staff, and currently have the highest number of employees in history.

The Atlantic Veterinary College completed the fifth year of its 10-year funding agreement with the four Atlantic Provinces, enjoying great success. This year, for the first time, AVC met certain Key Performance Indicators (KPIs),



allowing for additional funding over and above the guaranteed one per cent funding increase to its general operating grant.

Looking ahead to 2019–20, we are projecting total operating revenues and total operating expenses of \$124.2 million, a record high.

Core revenue in the budget is allocated towards the cost of important University activities including student and ancillary services, faculties and schools, academic support, administration, and property/maintenance. We continue to work diligently to grow revenues to help offset these costs and pressures such as increased labour costs, important infrastructure upgrades, increasing supply costs, and inflationary pressures.

Healthy people mean a healthy university. In 2019–20, UPEI will continue to make investments to support a healthy and vibrant campus environment. Our University will continue to work with government, donors, faculty, staff, alumni, and students to develop new academic programs and grow our physical and mental health services. We do this by expanding our unique offerings and delivering them in innovative ways.

As we look to the future, I encourage you to reflect on what UPEI has achieved last year, but also over the last fifty years as we celebrate UPEI at 50. We will soon be completing the most ambitious friend-raising campaign in our history, INSPIRE!, and have received great support from the community, reaching our \$50 million goal early. The economic and cultural impacts of our students, faculty, staff, and alumni go well beyond our campus to communities across the Island. In addition, UPEI makes important contributions to the economies of PEI and Canada through our research agenda and expertise, and we look forward to continue working with our government counterparts to propel opportunities forward.

With every year, my amazement builds at how UPEI's innovation is having more and more impact. I sincerely thank all of our faculty and staff for their contributions to our University, and our students for choosing UPEI. As we celebrate our 50th anniversary in 2019, I hope that you will share my enthusiasm for our future initiatives and what they will mean to our University for the next 50 years.

Budget Highlights

Introduction

The University of Prince Edward Island exists to better our community by developing people to their full potential. In 2019, the University will mark 50 years as a leader in education and research in our province, creating impact felt well beyond Island shores.

The 2019-20 Operating Budget has been developed with the intent to support the top five priorities of the University's 2018-2023 Strategic Plan. The top priorities for the next four years include:

- Education for a connected world
- Inclusive campus culture
- Scholarship, research and discovery
- Community partnerships
- · Responsible growth and resource management.





Operating Context

The University of Prince Edward Island continues to be successful in attracting a wide variety of outstanding students. This growth has assisted in supporting the University's budget as tuition continues to be the second largest source of operating revenue. The University continues to rely on the provincial government for its largest source of revenue in the form of provincial government grants.

Beginning in 2018-19, the Government of PEI committed to a three-year funding agreement for the general operating grant of the University. The base provincial operating grant will be increased by 2% until 2020-21. In 2014, the four Atlantic provinces committed to a ten-year funding agreement for the Atlantic Veterinary College. These commitments to multi-year funding models better financial planning opportunities for the University.

The 2019-20 Operating Budget, as presented, is a <u>balanced</u> budget of revenues and expenditures.

This operating budget is founded upon the following assumptions:

- The Government of PEI will increase its unrestricted operating grant to the University (excluding the Atlantic Veterinary College) by 2% (\$661,200).
 - The four Atlantic Provinces will increase the unrestricted operating grant to the AVC by 1.25% (\$256,300).
 - Other restricted and targeted grants will be adjusted as per individual agreements with the funders. Details are provided in Chart 3B.
 - Tuition and fees will increase as recommended in this budget (Appendix A). An increase has been budgeted for undergraduate enrolment revenues to reflect the growth in enrolments in 2018-19. Post-graduate tuition budgets have been adjusted on a program-by-program basis.
 - Salary and benefits budgets are based upon projected salary costs, step increments and benefit costs.

The University of Prince Edward Island Operating Budget has been reviewed through all regular University governance channels. The Budget Committee and the Board of Governors' Finance and Audit Committee recommend that this operating budget be approved by the UPEI Board of Governors at its regular April meeting.

Operating Budget Development

The Operating Budget is the University's primary financial management tool. During development of the budget, long-term sustainability is a key area of focus.

The University develops its annual operating budget through a process of reviewing anticipated cost drivers, enrolments, and other key revenue inputs. Budget submissions are made from the university departments through the appropriate dean or director to their vice-president. These proposals are discussed and prioritized by the senior executive team of the University.

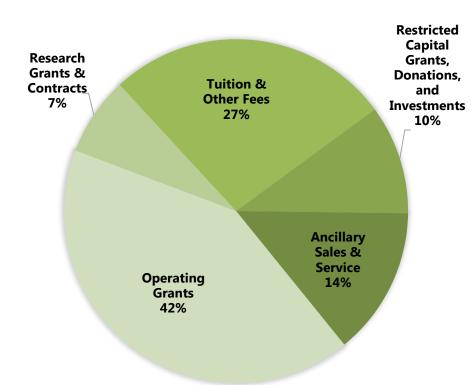
The Atlantic Veterinary College (AVC) operates with a separate operating budget (Appendix B). The AVC is now operating in its fifth year of a 10-year funding agreement with the four Atlantic Provinces. This agreement guarantees a 1% funding increase per annum in the general operating grant, plus allows for additional funding if certain Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) are met.

While this document represents the operating budget of the University, it is focused on the resources that support the operations. The University receives funds from other sources for sponsored research, capital projects, and endowments. As illustrated in **Chart 1A**, UPEI received \$147.8 million in revenues from all sources during the 2017-18 fiscal year.

As seen in Chart 1B (right), operating grants and tuition revenues represent the largest portion of the Operating Budget.

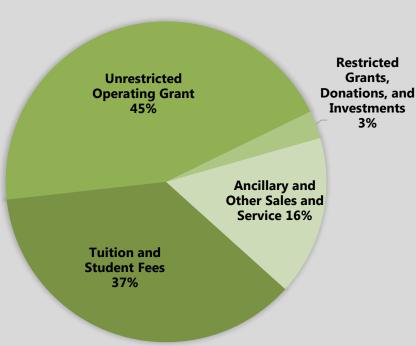
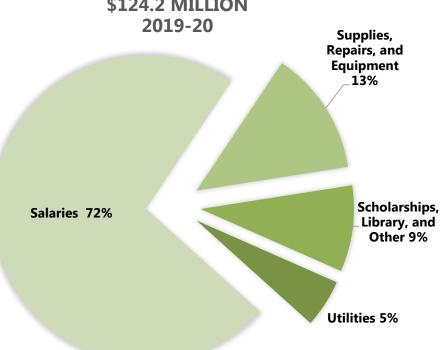


Chart 2 - UPEI Expenditure Budget 2019-20

The core resource for any university is its workforce. UPEI is home to over 950 talented faculty and staff.

As seen in **Chart 2** (left), over 70% of the UPEI Operating Budget is allocated to salaries and benefits. Other major expenditures include utilities, departmental supplies, scholarships, equipment and debt financing, and library materials.

Operating Revenues

Provincial Operating Grants

The Government of PEI provides general operating grants and restricted operating grants for specific programs. The Provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Newfoundland and Labrador provide grants to the Government of PEI to fund the Atlantic Veterinary College under a four-party funding agreement. This ten-year agreement covers the period of 2014–2024 and provides the Atlantic Veterinary College guaranteed operating grants with annual increases in funding plus additional increases if certain Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) are met. Several of the KPIs are calculated using a three-year rolling average. For 2019-20, the AVC will receive a 1.25% increase in its operating grant based on the 2017-18 KPI calculations.

The University receives annual capital grants from the Government of PEI to fund debt retirement for infrastructure loans. Only the restricted alterations and renovations and equipment grants are included in the annual operating budget. Capital maintenance and infrastructure grants support capital debt financing and are not part of the operating budget.

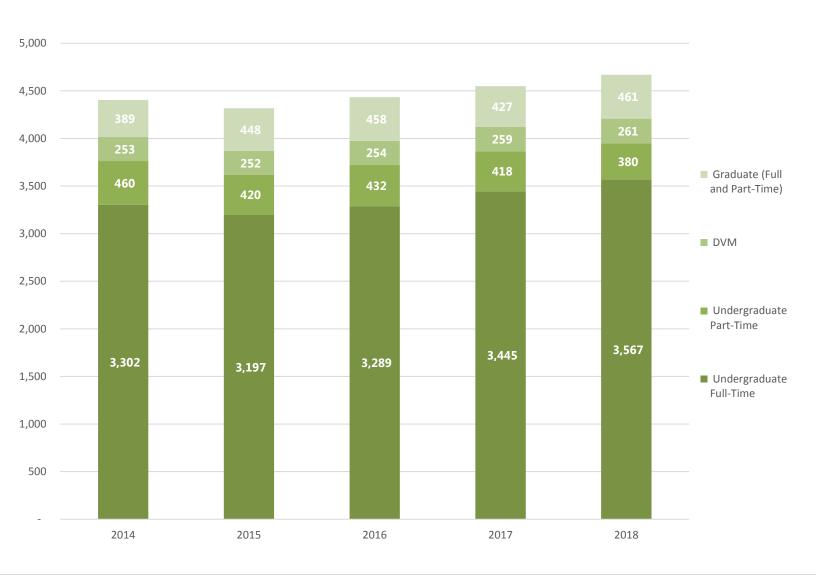


Enrolment

Revenues from student enrolments has continued to be strong. Over the last five years, the University has experienced approximately 8% growth in the full-time undergraduate student population. Across the Maritimes, full-time and part-time undergraduate and graduate student enrolment declined by 6.2% during the same time period.

UPEI Enrolment at October 1st





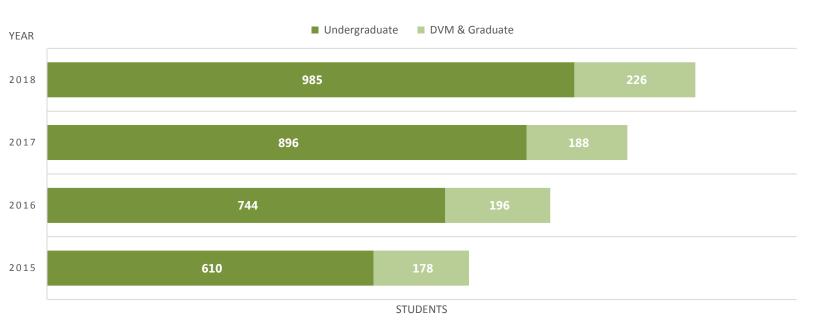
International Enrolment

At October 1

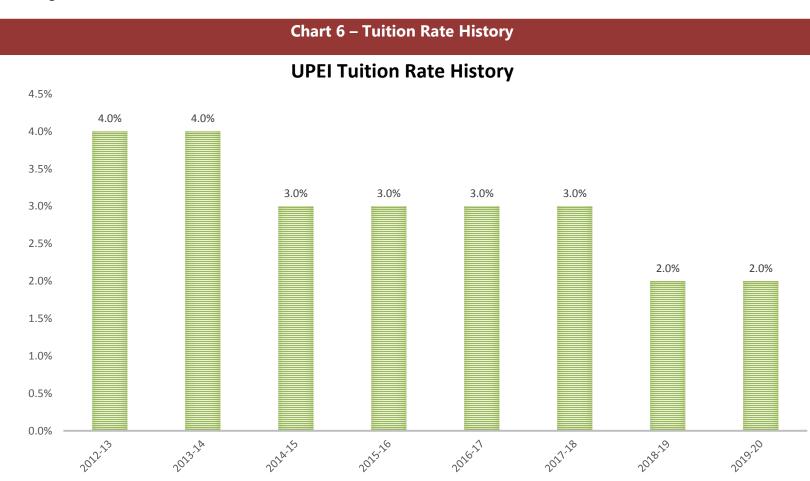






Tuition and Fees

Tuition and fee revenues are an important part of UPEI's plan to balance the operating budget. They represent approximately one third (1/3) of the operating revenues each year. When increasing tuition rates, consideration is given to both the need for additional revenues along with the need to provide affordable tuition for students. UPEI continues to meet this need with moderate increases in most programs, while still being able to provide one of the lowest undergraduate tuition rates in the Maritime Provinces.



This budget includes the following increases:

Undergraduate tuition increase: 2% or \$12 per course
 International fee increase: 2% or \$14 per course

Graduate tuition increase:
 2% per program, amounts vary

The Faculty of Veterinary Medicine tuition will also increase by 2% with the exception of international tuition. International tuition will remain at \$66,500 per annum until 2019. This tuition rate was established in 2016 as a result of comparative support from regional sources and competitive market place analysis.



Other Revenues

Ancillary Enterprises

Ancillary enterprises continue to add value to the University by way of providing needed services as well as continuing to add resources to the central operations of the University. Ancillary revenues are generated by the UPEI Bookstore, residences, food and conference services, vending, and parking. These activities generate approximately \$8 million in sales per year.

Sales and Services

The University generates sales revenues as an integral part of its operations. Significant sources of sales revenue are generated by the Veterinary Teaching Hospital, Diagnostics Services, and Animal Resources located at the Atlantic Veterinary College. These revenues are used to help support the teaching mission of this faculty.



Operating Expenditures

The University operating expenditures capture the costs relating to all faculties and service units within the University.

Salaries and Benefits

- •Salaries and benefits are the largest component of the UPEI expenditure budget. In balancing the budget each year, the upward cost pressure of career progression increments, cost of living allowances, and increasing benefit costs must be managed. Because salaries and benefits are 72% of all operating expenditures, this is a key area of focus in the budget development process.
- •The University and the Unions currently have labour agreements in place until 2020 for most unions. These multi-year agreements allow for more predictability in the growth of labour costs.

Supplies and Other Expenditures

•The University uses supplies in many areas of the operations. The most significant areas of expenditure are in support of the revenue generating units such as Ancillary Services and the Veterinary Teaching Hospital. Supplies are also used to support the academic and administrative units of the University. Other expenditures include but are not limited to scholarships, travel, and research support. These expenditures are all in support of the academic mission of the University.

Equipment, Debt Financing, and Internal Financing

- •The majority of the University's external debt is funded by separate capital grants from the Government of PEI. Exceptions to this include the residence construction and renovation debt, which is funded by residence operating revenues, and some debt related to the AVC expansion.
- •In addition to residence and AVC long-term debt, the operating budget includes capital expenditures for equipment and equipment financing.

Utilities

•The utilities budget for the University is a significant fixed expenditure to plan for each year, as it represents approximately 5% of the University budget. The University's Facilities Management division continues to look for energy efficiencies by updating older equipment and lighting with new technologies.
