The Research Journey

Simply said, I love research and all activities related to it. Essentially, research is about cogitating on a topic of interest, meeting and talking to people located within that topical environment, and articulating the experience spent in that reflective zone of research.

More specifically, for me, research starts with a vision that is refined to a clearly-articulated purpose and one to five honed research questions. The creation of a new research project is often supported by a graduate student working with me to identify the methodology, research design, and theoretical lens best aligned with the purpose of the study. When working within the qualitative paradigm, it is time to collect the data, transcribe interviews, and analyze transcripts. Next, the research team *gives birth* to a paper that depicts the research path from its initial vision to its end results. Writing this paper is often time-consuming, frustrating, and liberating, all at the same time. With paper in-hand and suitcase packed, conferences are the next logical step. Not only do papers presented at conferences represent the knowledge and experience gained from the research, conferences are also opportunities for social networking and travel. Usually, after receiving feedback at the conference, minor revisions are done to the paper, and it is submitted to a journal in hopes of publication. The publication process is another emotionally intense process, imbued with anticipation, anxiety, and exultation. Frequently, feedback from peer-reviews indicates that the paper needs revisions, and the authors and I need to re-think and better articulate key issues. Using the prescriptive suggestions provided by reviewers, we improve the paper and, in turn, are often met with publication success.

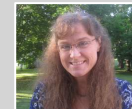
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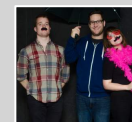

These documents represent research I have conducted with a graduate and undergraduate student and research that I initiated with my graduate friends when I was a PhD student.

As a final point, I have found that the first step on the journey of research is often a conversation with a colleague or close friend. I applaud the Graduate Students' Association and its production of this newsletter, because, I believe, this document will be a springboard to fertile research conversations among graduate students.
