We represented UPEI GSA in the Canadian Federation of Students' Annual National General Meeting, which was held in Gatineau from November 18 to 21. As international students at UPEI, it was our pleasure to attend the national CFS meeting. We spent five nights and four days discussing topics concerning post-secondary education with our peers through different lenses, especially in the international constituency, the national graduate caucus, and the maritime regional meeting. Even though the schedule was very tight during those days, we learned so much about how educational policies and movements were made. We also gained insights into the Canadian educational system when comparing to that in our home country China.

As UPEI GSA delegates, we participated in the educational policies making process, which was an unique and precious experience. The meeting came after the Nov 2 Day of Action fighting for universal access to post-secondary education. As first time delegates, we came to understand the origin and importance of student movements. By amplifying the voice of students through movements, our needs will be heard and potentially met. For example, as international fees had been increasing year by year without counseling international students in Canada, we supported keeping international fees locked at a certain range and a national campaign coming in the near future.

The issue of international fee increase was only one of the many concerns brought up by universities across Canada at the conference. There were also a lot of other issues related to the racialized, marginalized, indigenous, and oppressed groups of students either being international or domestic being discussed and voted at the national level. UPEI's Student Diversity Office (SDO) is a student directed office under the leadership of the current student Coordinator Emily Eddie, in association with Student Affairs and the Diversity and Social Justice Studies program. SDO operates out of Student Affairs, office number 240.

We are mandated at the SDO with promoting understanding of the complexities of identities of all members of the campus community, including students, faculty and staff. Our goals include challenging normative, oppressive assumptions by raising awareness of social justice issues. We foster a campus community focused on inclusivity, accessibility, and acceptance. Through hosting events, such as Rants & Raves, What Else is Sex, Mental Health Week's Lets Listen, and Difficult Dialogues, we encourage student engagement and discussion of social justice issues.

The first semester of the 2016-2017 year at the SDO was a busy one. In collaboration with Jam for Justice, a school club that promotes well-being through music on UPEI campus, the SDO was part of the semester's "Concert for Comfort", a concert full of many different forms of musical expression and held in the open environment of the Chaplaincy Centre. SDO also worked with AIDS PEI to create the SDO's version of the Hands Up for #HIVprevention Campaign on UPEI campus. In terms of day-to-day work, you may see interactive installations around campus such as the "Post as Secret" wall, and the "Outrage Tree".

The Student Diversity Office encourages students to think critically as a way to better understand the variety of issues and concerns raised by the campus community. We provide a space where community members can feel comfortable to engage with the coordinators about issues they feel are important.
