RECAP ON GSA EVENT: WOMEN IN THE ACADEMY, #DISTRACTINGLYSEXY

Nearly 30 people attended the event, which was held in the Faculty Lounge on Thursday June 18 at noon. The discussion The topics that were was lively, passionate, and personal. discussed were diverse, and included things like what sexism means, hiring practices in universities, the influence and power of social media, attitudes, implicit biases, and some women shared personal stories and experiences of sexism, discrimination, and harassment. Dr. Christian LaCroix was asked about the systems in place at UPEI, to which he responded that women should be able to go to their superiors at the university to talk about anything that they were uncomfortable with, including sexism. Dr. Bonnie Stewart concluded that even though many in attendance had not experienced direct or major instances of sexism, it is important that we do not say that sexism is not happening. Negative attitudes about and biases toward women still exist, and saying that "everything is okay" does not help. Overall, it was a great event. Keep an eye out for upcoming events!

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
