The President also spoke to the two recent notices around a new residence and the connection to the Canada Games 2023. In the past, residences were always supported by student fees. Labor and material costs are now so high that this practice is unsustainable. The President noted that he's still working with Government to finalize details and that they are in very early stages of negotiations. One of the students reported that during the new student orientation, she had a number of international students stating they had no place to live.

A. Braithwaite commended the University in raising the "trans flag" recently as well as the aboriginal flag in the past. This showed respect for the University as a whole and indicated that UPEI embraces all aspects of life. The President noted that diversity fits with our strategic plan.

D. Sutton stated that since we now have a Faculty of Graduate Studies, questions arose around who should sign parchments for graduating students. Currently, the President, the Dean of the Discipline, and the Registrar sign all parchments. It is being recommended that the Dean of Graduate Studies be added to the list of signees. # CS-1410 Introduction to Computer Programming for Scientists

This course is an introduction to computer programming for non-computer science majors. Topics include problem-solving, algorithm design, data types, control structures, repetition, loops, nested structures, modular programming and arrays. Three lecture hours and 1.5 hours of laboratory session per week. NOTE: Credit will be allowed for only one of CS 1410 or Engineering 1310. As well, CS 1410 may not be taken concurrently with, or after, CS 1910 (formerly 1510). Prerequisite: Grade XII academic mathematics

### **CS-1410 Introduction to Computer**

Programming for Scientists This course is an introduction to computer programming for non-computer science majors. Topics include problem-solving, algorithm design, data types, control structures, repetition, loops, nested structures, modular programming and arrays. Three lecture hours and 1.5 hours of laboratory session per week. NOTE: Credit will be allowed for only one of CS 1410 or Engineering 1310. As well, CS 1410 may not be taken concurrently with, or after, CS 1910 (formerly 1510). Prerequisite: Grade XII academic mathematics

Rationale for Change: Course was never taught and revisions to CS 1910 make it redundant.
