Research Funding Success



Congratulations to **Dr. Megan Jones**, Director, CWHC Atlantic Region, for her recent success in getting funding from Environment and Climate Change Canada for the service project entitled "Monitoring secondary lead poisoning in scavenging birds in Atlantic Canada". The total award is \$13,500 (\$4,500/year for three years).

Dr. Megan Jones and CWHC Atlantic also received a grant for \$7,045.00 from the PEI Wildlife Conservation Fund for a project entitled "Distribution and characterization of sarcoptic mange in red foxes."

Dr. Megan Jones and CWHC Atlantic also received funding from the Department of Fisheries and Oceans (DFO) Marine Mammal Response Program. The total DFO funding is \$69,680.



Dr. Laura Bourque is a key collaborator on the DFO Marine Mammal Response program. The Program goal is "Enhancement of marine mammal response in waters of DFO Gulf and Maritimes Regions" (primarily via equipment purchase). This funding has supported the purchase of a new truck to replace the current Biomedical Sciences/Pathology and Microbiology vehicle (\$33,355.00). It is a 2019 Dodge Ram 1500 truck. The Dean's Office paid the difference (\$1,675) over the DFO funds. Biomedical Sciences/Pathology and Microbiology will pay for the maintenance and insurance of the shared vehicle.

North Atlantic Whale Necropsy

On June 7, 2019, a team from Canadian Wildlife Health Cooperative, Atlantic, performed a necropsy on an endangered North Atlantic Right Whale on Miscou Island, NB. The juvenile male Right whale had been observed dead on June 4, 2019, in the Gulf of St Lawrence, and was subsequently towed to Miscou Island by the Department of Fisheries and Oceans and the Canadian Coast Guard. **Dr. Laura Bourque** (lead pathologist on the case), **Dr. Megan Jones, Dr. Pierre-Yves Daoust, Dr. Dave McRuer** (Parks Canada Wildlife Health Specialist and Adjunct Faculty at AVC), **Tessa McBurney**, and summer students Amanda Clark (AVC Class of 2021, and Hanna Ruark (AVC Class of 2022, Companion Animals) worked with teams from the Marine Animal Response Society, CWHC Quebec, the Department of Fisheries and Oceans, and other organizations to complete the necropsy.



2019 Chinook Project Update

In June 2019, the Chinook Project team will travel to Northern Labrador to provide free veterinary services to two locations. Nain is the northernmost community in Labrador, and this will be the fifth time the Chinook Project has visited this hamlet. Natuashish (moved from Davis Inlet in 2002) is one of the two Innu communities in Labrador. The Chinook project has visited this community three times in the past, the last visit being in 2015. Both communities have multiple positive rabies cases each year. In addition, a canine distemper outbreak in Natuashish in 2018 affected the dog population greatly.

The team will spend 4.5 clinic days in each location, and hope to see many animals for vaccinations, deworming and spay/neuter surgeries, as well as any other procedures provided. School visits also have been booked to speak to youth about humane education topics and opportunities in animal sciences such as the Tim Ogilvie AVC Vet Camp.

The veterinarians travelling this year are mostly

from AVC: Dr. Heather Gunn-McQuillan, Dr. Peter Foley and Dr. Mike West. Dr. Becky Jackson of Happy Valley-Goose Bay will also attend

for the first week of the trip. Five fourth-year veterinary students will participate in the rotation: Bryan Welch, Ashley Kroyer, Heather Chandler, Veronica Ells, and Rachael Speare.

Hey Islanders, have you seen a bat? Then call the bat phone!

Are bats back for the summer? Call 1-833-434-BATS (2287)!



Spring is finally approaching, which means bats will soon emerge from their hibernacula and return to their summer roosting sites. People in Prince Edward Island (PEI) and Newfoundland and Labrador (NL) are encouraged to call the toll-free bat hotline —

1-833-434-BATS (2287) — to let researchers know that their bats are returning.

The bat hotline is based out of the Canadian Wildlife Health Cooperative (CWHC) Atlantic Region at the Atlantic Veterinary College, PEI, and is a collaborative project between the CWHC and the provincial governments in PEI and NL. The bat hotline has now been in place for just over a year, and calls from citizen scientists have been providing researchers with essential information on two federally endangered bat species: the little brown myotis and the northern myotis. The hotline received 178 calls in the last year (February 2018-2019), which enabled the following data to be collected: 157 reports of bat sightings, colony counts from 37 bat roosts, submission of 7 dead bats for necropsy and testing.

Researchers are asking for the public's help with monitoring local bat populations by doing colony counts if homeowners have roosting bats on their property, or by reporting bat sightings and potential roost sites of bats.

The health of bats in Atlantic Canada is threatened by the devastating disease bat white-nose syndrome (WNS), which continues to spread in the region, significantly impacting endangered bat species. WNS was only recently confirmed in NL in 2017, so it is crucial that bat populations in the province be closely monitored. WNS was first detected in PEI in 2013; however, bats are still being found infected with the fungus. To learn more about WNS, please visit <u>http://www.cwhc-rcsf.ca/wns.php</u>.

Keynote Speaker at the International Congress of Bovine Medicine in Spain



Dr. Alfonso López, Professor Emeritus, was a keynote speaker at the XXIV International Congress of Bovine Medicine, hosted by the Spanish Association of Bovine Practitioners (ANEMBE) in Seville, Spain (May 22-24, 2019). Attending this meeting were over 300 participants, mainly from Spain, Portugal, and other European countries. Dr. López delivered a special presentation on the achievements and frustrations of veterinarians regarding bovine pneumonia over the last 50 years. During these many years, bovine pneumonia has been the number one cause of morbidity and mortality in feedlots in Canada, the United States, and several Latin American countries. One relevant point addressed by Dr. López was that much of the dogma on the pathogenesis of bovine respiratory diseases stemmed from Canadian investigations. His second presentation dealt with the comparative aspects of sepsis in human and veterinary medicine and the application of this misunderstood ailment in the ruminant practice. In his last lecture, Dr. López summarized the necropsy findings of the most common sequela of chronic pneumonia in dairy and feedlot cattle.
