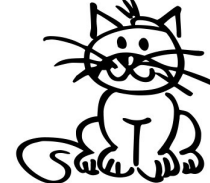

After lunch, you got to experience how a farm runs. It is amazing how much the farmers on the Island care about their animals. How was the dairy farm? Have you ever seen a cow that close up before? Don't you love the smell of a barn? Hope you didn't get any cow manure on your boots! MOOOOOO...



What we will do tomorrow...

To start the day, you will begin working more on your structure and function presentations—we need to have them done for Friday!

Artificial insemination (AI) is an important skill for veterinarians to learn. Can you think of some benefits to AI? See if you're able to locate the cow's cervix on the model.

Dr. Proudfoot will discuss the important topic of animal welfare and the Five Freedoms.

Next up should be some fun as you learn how to operate a microscope and identify the different types of blood cells. Can be a bit tricky adjusting the lens so you can get a clear, crisp view. Microscopes are used almost daily in vet medicine.



Just before lunch, you'll hear a lecture from Dr. Fraser on Pathology.

After a quick bite, it's outside to see an awesome demonstration by the RCMP Search Dog. These dogs are so well trained and love their jobs. They are very, very fast so keep your eyes on them.

Sapphire MacPhee is next up with an interesting session on vet med and mental health.



Last up for the day is Pet First Aid, where you'll learn how to treat injuries to pets and what goes into a first aid kit. You never know when you'll be called upon to re-

spond!

Cheesy Dog Cookies

Ingredients:

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 1/4 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 1/2 c. vegetable oil
- 4 - 5 Tbsp. water



Directions:

Combine everything except water. Whisk in food processor until consistency of cornmeal. Then add water until mixture forms a ball. Roll it into 1/2" thickness and cut into shapes. Bake on ungreased cookie sheets about 10 minutes (depending on size of shapes) at 400 F. Cool and store in the refrigerator.
