Top Transferable Skills

Problem-Solving: Apply critical thinking to examine national and international-related topics considering multiple perspectives to take informed action.

Intercultural Awareness: Understand both your own and other cultures, and the similarities and differences between them, which may be connected to values, beliefs, and/or behaviour.

Top Transferable Skills

Self Awareness: Regularly reflect and analyze self-identity, influences, assumptions, and values.

Communication: Actively listen, give and receive critical feedback, effectively communicate ideas to others through refined presentation and cohesive arguments using verbal and written communication channels.
