

OPERATING BUDGET FOR THE 2023-2024 FISCAL YEAR



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Message from the President and Vice-Chancellor

Dear Members of the University Community,

The University of Prince Edward Island is a vital part of the PEI landscape—bringing educational opportunity, cultural enrichment, population and diversity enhancement, and economic advancement to the province. Our primary focus is on supporting our students so they can reach their potential in both the classroom and the community. We use a fiscally conservative approach in our budget process to maintain sound finances and continued fiscal discipline, which will ensure we can sustainably support further momentum and future growth.

Embedded in our 2023–24 budget plan is a strong commitment to investing in transformational initiatives that align with the values that guide our work, while at the same time enhancing the student experience.

While revenues are growing in ancillary services (primarily residence) and sales (primarily at the Atlantic Veterinary College (AVC) Teaching Hospital), these are largely offset by direct expenses in those areas. The two main sources of revenue for UPEI remain tuition, and core operating and restricted grants from the Government of Prince Edward Island.

Like other areas of our society, UPEI is facing inflationary pressures. The University continues to seek efficiencies to keep costs low despite having the lowest proportion of its budget spent on administration among regional comparator universities (Canadian Association of University Business Officers).

As noted in this year's budget document, we are recognizing commitments from the Government of Prince Edward Island that will support health professional training and the Faculty of Indigenous Knowledge, Education, Research and Applied Studies. Additionally, the provincial government, in recognition of the role the University plays in the PEI community, is proposing an increase in our operating grant of approximately \$3.0 million. This support will assist the University in addressing inflationary pressures, while keeping tuition costs affordable for our students.

As part of our conservative approach, projections on student tuition revenues are based on previous-year student enrolment numbers. As of October 5, 2022, our student population was 5,533, an increase of 2.1% over 2021. While student numbers from PEI remained relatively the same, the number of students from other Canadian provinces rose 4.2% and international student enrolment increased by 7.0%. Our 1,703 international students came from 96 countries. UPEI has the lowest undergraduate tuition in the region and in the last six years, UPEI's full-time tuition fee per undergraduate student grew by 13.4% (domestic) and 13.6% (international), which is the lowest rate of growth, by more than half, in the Maritimes. With the generous support of the Government of PEI, we are able to maintain tuition growth at the previously communicated 4.0% (\$26 per three-credit course). Growth in international fees will also rise 4.0%, while tuition for both domestic and international students at AVC will rise 6.0%.

Throughout this budget process, our dedicated faculty and staff have remained committed to the University's mission of delivering outstanding education, conducting important research, and contributing to our community in transformative ways. Supporting our students remains our first and foremost priority. Our goal has been to be accountable and fiscally responsible while still carrying on the important work of the University and preserving its integrity as a place of higher learning.

A series of conversations will be held this Fall to provide the UPEI community with more details about our strategic priorities as well as our budget. In the meantime, I thank all our faculty and staff for their dedication and hard work and our students for choosing UPEI—and I applaud the entire UPEI community for their resiliency and commitment to our University.



On behalf of UPEI, I am pleased to present a balanced annual operating budget for the 2023–24 fiscal year. Together, we are taking important steps forward in becoming an even better UPEI that serves the best interests of our students, faculty, and staff. Let's keep the momentum going.

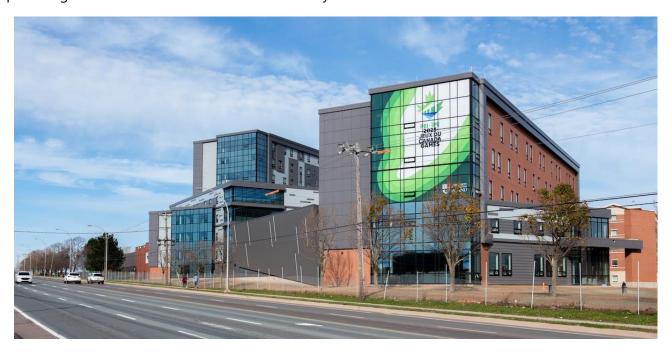

Budget Highlights

Introduction

The University of Prince Edward Island is built on the foundation of liberal education, has the purpose of inspiring and aiding individuals in obtaining the abilities, information, and comprehension essential for analytical and imaginative thinking, thereby equipping them to enhance both their personal growth and society's advancement through the realization of their full potential. To achieve these objectives, the University operates as a fellowship of intellectuals whose principal responsibilities include teaching and learning, conducting research and scholarship, and providing beneficial services to our Island and beyond.



The 2023-24 Operating Budget reflects substantial growth for the University. In 2023-24, the developmental budget for the Faculty of Medicine, the expansion of the nursing program and health centre are reflected in the budget. In 2022-23, UPEI launched the innovative Faculty of Indigenous Knowledge, Education, Research, and Applied Studies (IKERAS) as part of our commitment to Truth and Reconciliation. Funding for that program, including a proportion from the Government of Prince Edward Island, has become part of our budget in 2023-24. The University's ancillary enterprises are also growing largely due to the recent opening of a new residence that the Canada Games athletes first used. This growth in ancillary services not only enhances the overall student experience but also contributes to the vibrant campus atmosphere. These initiatives (Health, IKERAS and Residence), along with recognition of past growth in revenue, primarily from the AVC Veterinary Teaching Hospital, represent year-over-year budgetary growth of more than \$17 million dollars. Coupled with modest tuition revenue growth from student number increases and course fees, and an increased level of core provincial government support, the total budget growth is more than \$24 million dollars. Despite inflationary pressures in areas such as supplies, utilities, and equipment and maintenance costs, this University continues to grow and invest in our people. This budget invests more than \$17.3 million new dollars (70% of the total budget growth) in people to support new and existing programming and services.

Budget Assumptions

The 2023-24 Operating Budget, as presented, is a <u>balanced</u> budget of revenues and expenses, derived from the following assumptions:



The Government of PEI will increase its unrestricted operating grant to the University (excluding the Atlantic Veterinary College) by \$2,858,000.



The four Atlantic Provinces will increase the unrestricted operating grant to the AVC by 1% (\$211,000). The Province of PEI has provided additional funding for 2023-24 in anticipation of a new interprovincial funding agreement.



Other restricted and targeted grants will be adjusted as per individual agreements with the funders. Details are provided in Chart 4C.



Tuition and fees will increase as recommended in this budget (Appendix A). Post-graduate tuition budgets are adjusted on a program-by-program basis.



An increase has been budgeted for undergraduate revenues to reflect the growth in enrolments in 2022-23.



Salary and benefits budgets are based upon projected salary costs for existing and new employees in support of expanded programing and services, as well as step increments and benefit costs.

Operating Budget – Key Factors



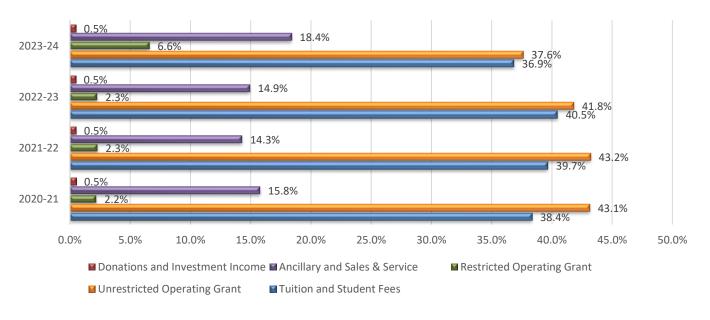
The University of Prince Edward Island relies on the Operating Budget as its primary means of financial planning and funding for its operational expenses. This budget is carefully crafted to align with the University's strategic objectives.

The 2023-24 Operating Budget provides a financial roadmap to support University faculties, academic support services, administrative functions, property maintenance, student services, and other ancillary enterprises. While the primary focus during the annual budget development is on the upcoming fiscal year, decision-making always takes into account the long-term sustainability of UPEI's strategic plan.

The University engages in a comprehensive review process to formulate its yearly operating budget, which involves analyzing various factors such as projected expenses, student enrolments, potential growth prospects, and other significant sources of revenue. The University relies primarily on two revenue streams, namely tuition and student fees and operating grants, to fund its operations.

Operating Revenues

Provincial Operating Grants



Apart from the general operating grant, the Province of PEI also provides restricted operating grants for specific programs. Under a four-party funding agreement (Chart 4B), the Provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Newfoundland and Labrador offer grants to the Government of PEI to finance the Atlantic Veterinary College.

The AVC will be functioning in its final year of a 10-year funding agreement with the four Atlantic Provinces in 2023-24. This agreement ensures a yearly 1% funding increase in the general operating

grant and allows for additional funding if specific Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) are achieved. The AVC will obtain a 1% increase in its operating grant for 2023-24 based on the 2021-22 KPI calculations. The Government of PEI has provided additional core funding for 2023-24 in advance of negotiating the new interprovincial funding agreement.

Provincial Operating Grants (Continued)

UPEI receives targeted multi-year funding from both the federal and provincial governments for specific programs, as well as assistance for equipment purchases and renovations that are part of its regular operations.

During 2022-23, the University received new provincial grants for the Faculty of Indigenous Knowledge, Education, Research and Applied Studies (IKERAS), and for new health initiatives, including the expansion of both the Faculty of Nursing and Health and Wellness Center, and the development of a new Faculty of Medicine. These restricted grants have now been added to the budget based on multi-year plans. The province additionally increased the restricted alterations and renovation budget by \$400,000 for 2023-24 and the mental health support grant that is calculated based on student enrolments.

Enrolment

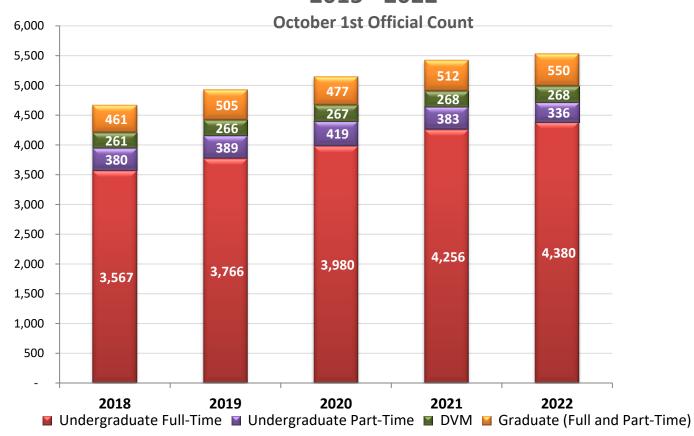
Revenues from student enrolments have continued to be strong. Since 2018, the University has experienced approximately 22.8% growth in the number of full-time undergraduate students and 19.3% growth in the number of full-time and part-time graduate students. (Chart 5).

This growth in student enrolment not only contributes to the financial stability of the institution but also creates a diverse and dynamic learning community that benefits all students, faculty, and staff.

International Enrolment

Over the last five years, UPEI has witnessed a substantial rise in its international student community, with an increase of approximately 45.7%. This growth has led to having student representation from 96 distinct countries.

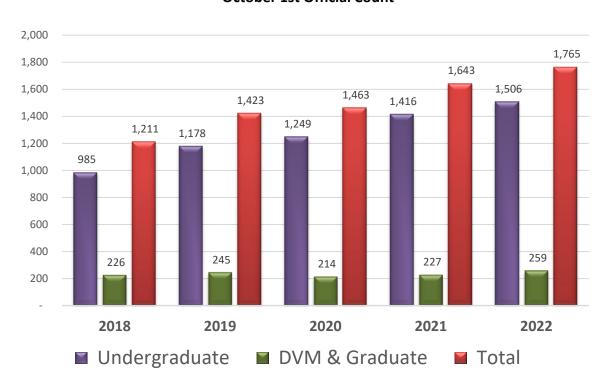

Tuition and Fees

UPEI relies significantly on tuition and fee revenues to achieve a balanced operating budget, accounting for roughly 37% of its yearly operating income. To ensure that tuition remains affordable for students, UPEI carefully considers the necessity of generating additional revenue when contemplating tuition rate increases. As a result of the support UPEI will receive from the province in 2023-24, the University is able to maintain its commitment to affordable tuition. The University will be implementing moderate increases across most programs, thereby offering the lowest undergraduate tuition rate among comparators in the Maritime Provinces for the 2022-23 academic year (Chart 7).

This budget includes the following increases as well as certain fee changes. The complete listing of Tuition and Fees can be found in Appendix A.

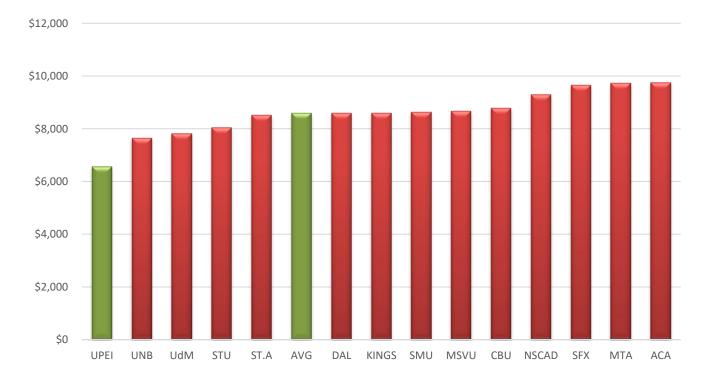

Other Revenue

Ancillary Enterprises

Ancillary enterprises are a valuable asset to the University as they offer essential services to students and other members of the University community. UPEI was delighted to open a new residence building that hosted hundreds of athletes during the 2023 Canada Winter Games. This new residence has 374 beds and will provide needed living accommodations for our students during a challenging housing market. This addition of a new residence has led to a substantial increase in the budget allocated to ancillary enterprises.

Sales and Services

The University relies on sales revenues to facilitate its operations, with the Veterinary Teaching Hospital, Diagnostics Services, and Animal Resources at the Atlantic Veterinary College serving as major contributors. These revenues are instrumental in supporting the faculty's educational objectives.

The emergency services division of the Veterinary Teaching Hospital has experienced substantial expansion, which resulted in significant revenue growth over the last few years. The growth in these revenues which is now reflected in the 2023-24 budget.



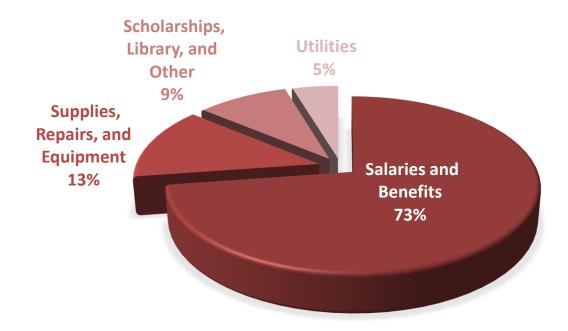


Operating Expenditures

UPEI's faculty and staff contribute to the goals of the institution and are crucial to the success of any university operation. This is reflected in the allocation of a significant portion (73%) of the operating budget towards salaries and benefits. Additional substantial expenses include utilities, departmental supplies, equipment and debt financing, scholarships, and library materials.

Expenses

The University's operating expenditures capture the costs relating to all faculties and service units within the University.

Salaries and Benefits

Salaries and benefits are the most significant component of the UPEI expenditure budget.
The budget planning process includes estimating career progression increments, cost of living
adjustments, and increasing benefit costs. As salaries and benefits amount to 73% of all operating
expenditures, this is a crucial area of focus in the budget development process. Salaries and benefits
include contracted staff members for secondments and institutional partnerships.

Supplies and Other Expenditures

• The University uses supplies in many areas of its operations. The most significant areas of expenditure are in support of the revenue generating units, such as ancillary enterprises and the Veterinary Teaching Hospital. Supplies are also used to support the academic and administrative units of the University. Other expenditures include but are not limited to scholarships, travel, and research support. These expenditures are all in support of the academic mission of the University.

Repairs and Maintenance

• The University receives restricted funding to support a portion of the annual repairs and maintenance costs for the campus, however, deferred maintenance costs of an aging infrastructure continue to put pressure on the University Operating Budget. The University is receiving additional restricted funding for the 2023-24 fiscal year (Chart 4C).

Equipment, Debt Financing, and Internal Financing

- The majority of the University's external debt is funded by separate capital grants from the Government of PEI. Exceptions to this include the residence construction and renovation debt, which is funded by residence operating revenues, and debt related to the AVC expansion.
- In addition to residence and AVC long-term debt, the operating budget includes capital expenditures for equipment and equipment financing.

Utilities

Utilities are significant expenditures to plan for, as they represent approximately 5% of the annual
operating budget. The Facilities Management division follows the University Sustainability Policy to
control temperature settings for heating and cooling both on a seasonal basis, as well as during lower
occupancy times. Buildings are continually assessed to highlight future energy savings opportunities.
