

# OPERATING BUDGET FOR THE 2024-2025 FISCAL YEAR



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### Message from the President and Vice-Chancellor

Dear Members of the University Community,

Planning for the University of Prince Edward Island's core operating budget begins in late fall by reviewing our obligations: for example, salary and step commitments under our collective agreements and requirements for utilities. This is analogous to how you would examine your household budget for rent or mortgage payments, groceries, car payments, etc. Once these initial needs are identified, we then consider any changes based on our institutional priorities.

Subsequent to the release of the *UPEI Review* in June 2023, we found ourselves being challenged to demonstrate that we are living up to our UPEI values, particularly those of accountability and integrity, and equity, diversity, inclusion, and Indigenization. These values need to be at the forefront of our processes and decision making when developing our budget.

In early November 2023, a new budget process was outlined in a message to faculty and staff. Since that time, the University has also been in a process of consultation to develop an action plan to build a culture of trust, safety, and inclusion on our campus. For too long, the University has not invested in key areas that support students, faculty, and staff.

Therefore, with the *UPEI Review* and the draft *UPEI Action Plan on Cultural Renewal* as backdrops, we centered our 2024–2025 budget priorities around student success and employee support. Students and employees require services and supports in order to thrive and achieve their academic and professional potential and have a positive experience at school and work.

Each of the vice-presidents and the Chief Information Officer (CIO) developed a budget process specific to their areas that focussed on these priorities and consulted their teams during the development of their budget proposals. Using the feedback from this process and with the support of the Comptroller, I prepared the draft operating budget to present to the Board of Governors for approval.

With this budget, we are devoting substantial resources to areas such as the creation of an Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (EDI) and Human Rights department, and additional support for the Human Resources and Security Services departments, as well as substantial investments in Student Affairs. In December 2023, UPEI announced seven new hires in these areas. Since then, we have hired a new Director of Human Resources and a Manager of Security Services. Funding for an additional 12 new staff members in primarily front-line positions related to supports for students, staff and faculty is also included in this budget.

All of this growth comes at substantial financial cost. We are grateful for the support given to us by the provincial government, but we also need to continue to grow internal resources. UPEI continues to have the lowest undergraduate tuition fees in the region according to the Maritime Provinces Higher Education Commission. In 2023, UPEI undergraduate tuition was 24 and 29 per cent below the regional average for domestic and international students, respectively. To support and meet the financial needs of our academic programs, both domestic and international tuition at UPEI and the Atlantic Veterinary College will increase by five per cent.

The 2024–2025 budget allocates new core funding to support the hiring of additional tenure-track faculty members in the Faculty of Indigenous Knowledge, Education, Research and Applied Studies, as well as in other strategic areas. We are also continuing to invest in information technology improvements that touch our learning and work environments every day and enhance the safety and security of our networks.

As we continue to prepare our budget for 2024–25, the impact of changing student visa rules remains unclear. Because the number of returning international students (with existing visas) is relatively high compared to senior students expected to graduate, we are basing our budget on status quo student numbers for the coming year. Should student numbers not reach expectations, adjustments to the budget during the year may be required.



The University of Prince Edward Island is a vital part of the PEI landscape—bringing educational opportunity, cultural enrichment, population and diversity enhancement, and economic advancement to the province. Our primary focus is on supporting our students so they can reach their potential in both the classroom and the community.

#### Introduction

The University of Prince Edward Island, founded on the tradition of liberal education, exists to encourage and assist people to acquire the skills, knowledge, and understanding necessary for critical and creative thinking, and thus prepare them to contribute to their own betterment, and that of society, through the development of their full potential. To accomplish these ends, the University is a community of scholars whose primary tasks are to teach and to learn, to engage in scholarship and research, and to offer service for the benefit of our Island and beyond.



The Operating Budget acts as the University's primary means of financial planning for its operational expenses. This budget is carefully aligned with the University's strategic objectives and mission.

The 2024-25 Operating Budget provides a financial roadmap to support faculties, academic support services, administrative functions, property maintenance, student services, and other ancillary enterprises. While the primary focus during the annual budget development is on the upcoming fiscal year, decision-making always considers the long-term sustainability of the University.

### **Operating Budget – Key Factors**

#### **Faculty of Medicine and Health Centre**

The University of Prince Edward Island is establishing a Faculty of Medicine to house a joint Doctor of Medicine degree in partnership with the Memorial University of Newfoundland.

Unique in Canada, the new degree will bring together the strengths of both institutions. These include Memorial's expertise in rural and family medicine and UPEI's capabilities in, among other areas, nursing, clinical psychology, paramedicine, veterinary medicine and climate change and adaptation. The Faculty of Medicine will increase training opportunities for future



family doctors and general specialists and support the medical career aspirations of Island youth.

UPEI has a unique opportunity and duty as the provincial university to be part of the long-term solution to improve the current health-care system. Twenty undergraduate medical learners will begin their studies at UPEI in August 2025 as part of a regional campus of Memorial University's Faculty of Medicine. The timeline for this initiative mirrors that of other regional campuses being developed across the country.

The Faculty of Medicine and Health Centre relies on funding from the Government of Prince Edward Island through a restricted grant to support its operating budget. For the 2024-25 fiscal year, the operating budget is set to increase, growing from \$5.038 million to \$10.895 million. This substantial boost in funding will enable the Faculty to continue to grow in anticipation of the first intake of students.

#### The building is much more than the Faculty of Medicine.

The new building being constructed on the UPEI campus will eventually be home to 80 undergraduate students (20 students per year for four years). For the initial cohort, like other regional campuses across Canada, most of the lectures will be delivered remotely from the home campus in St. John's, Newfoundland and Labrador while clinical skills, anatomy labs, and group exercises will be all delivered in-person at UPEI.

The building will also contribute in other ways to health care on PEI by housing a Health PEI patient medical home (a collaborative interdisciplinary health clinic model) that will serve 10,000 Island patients, the UPEI Psychology Clinic, and the PEI Adult ADHD Clinic. The facility will feature a state-of-the-art simulation centre that will be used by other UPEI faculties as well as for continuing education opportunities for PEI physicians and other allied health professionals.



## Faculty of Indigenous Knowledge, Education, Research, and Applied Studies

UPEI's Faculty of Indigenous Knowledge, Education, Research, and Applied Studies (IKERAS) brings Indigenous knowledge and ways of doing to the forefront of the University, positioning UPEI as the role model for all universities to achieve decolonization and benefit from Indigenous knowledge.

In the 2024-25 fiscal year, IKERAS is poised for substantial growth. The provincial government has generously increased its funding for the Faculty from \$775K in 2023-24 to \$1.082M in 2024-25, representing a 40 per cent increase year-over-year.



#### **Action Plan**



In response to the Rubin Thomlinson independent third-party review of practices and processes at UPEI regarding harassment, discrimination, and fair treatment, the University has crafted an Action Plan. This plan outlines the University's unwavering commitment to much-needed change and serves as a roadmap for informed decisions and actions in the days, months, and years ahead. Its purpose is to meaningfully address the identified problems.

To fulfill the commitments outlined in the Action Plan and to bolster the essential cultural renewal, the University recognizes the need to enhance its capacity in several critical areas. These include Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (EDI) and Human Rights, Student Affairs, Human Resources, Security Services, and the oversight and audit of Action Plan implementation.

With substantial support from the provincial government, the University has also allocated additional resources to ensure the successful execution of this commitment.

#### Federal Cap on Undergraduate, DVM and BEd International Students

On January 22, 2024, the Government of Canada announced it will set an intake cap on international student permit applications to stabilize new growth for a period of two years. For 2024, the cap is expected to result in approximately 360,000 approved study permits, a decrease of 35 per cent from 2023.

While uncertainties remain regarding the potential impact on UPEI, strategic measures are being implemented to address the federal cap on international students. These include evaluating current enrolments procedures, increasing international tuition deposits, and strategically managing the issuance of attestation letters. The Government of PEI has been allocated 2,000 attestation letters of which 1,185 have been designated for UPEI. In 2023-24, the University issued 3,200 offer letters which converted to slightly over 700 new international students.



### **Operating Budget Assumptions**

The 2024-25 Operating Budget, as presented, is a <u>balanced</u> budget of revenues and expenses, derived from the following assumptions:



The Government of PEI will increase its unrestricted operating grant to the University (excluding the Atlantic Veterinary College) by \$4,469,000.



The four Atlantic Provinces are anticipated to increase the unrestricted operating grant to the AVC by \$2,044,000 through the interprovincial funding agreement.



Other restricted and targeted grants will be adjusted as per individual agreements with the funders. Details are provided in Chart 4C.



Tuition and fees will increase as recommended in this budget (Appendix A). Post-graduate tuition budgets are adjusted on a program-by-program basis.



Tuition revenues have been calculated using actual enrolments from 2023-24. This is a 0% change in enrolment numbers for 2024-25.



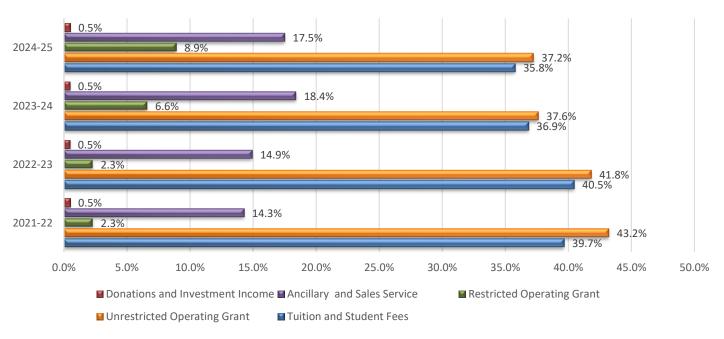
Salary and benefits budgets are based upon projected salary costs for existing and new employees in support of expanded programming and services, as well as step increments and benefit costs.

### **Operating Revenues**

The University engages in a comprehensive review process to formulate its yearly operating budget, which involves analyzing various factors such as projected expenses, student enrolments, potential growth prospects, and other significant sources of revenue. The University relies primarily on two revenue streams, namely tuition and student fees and operating grants, to fund its operations.

For the 2024-25 Operating Budget, approximately 37.2 per cent of its operations are funded from an unrestricted operating grant while 35.8 per cent is funded from tuition and student fees.





#### **Provincial Government Operating Grants**



The Government of PEI provides restricted and unrestricted operating grants for specific programs. Under an interprovincial agreement (Chart 4B), the Provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Newfoundland and Labrador offer grants to the Government of PEI to fund the Atlantic Veterinary College.

Subject to final approval, the AVC will be functioning in its first year of a new five-year funding agreement with the four Atlantic Provinces in 2024-25. This agreement ensures annual funding increases.

#### **Provincial Operating Grants (Continued)**



UPEI receives targeted multi-year funding from both the federal and provincial governments for specific programs, as well as assistance for equipment purchases and renovations that are part of its regular operations.

For 2024-25, the University will receive continued support for the new Faculty of Medicine, the Faculty of Nursing expansion, and the Health and Wellness Centre.

The initial time limited restricted grant assigned to the Faculty of IKERAS has been transitioned to the University's unrestricted operating grant, thereby changing it from a provisional to a permanent source of funding.

#### **Enrolment**

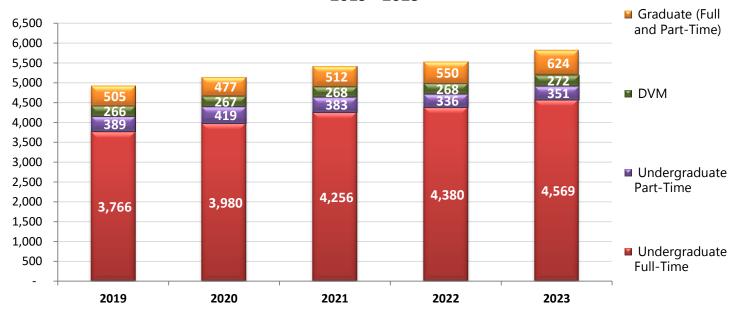
Since 2019, the University has seen a 17.5 per cent increase in full-time undergraduate students. Additionally, there has been a consistent 5.1 per cent year-over-year growth (as shown in Chart 5).

This growth not only reflects the institution's popularity but also contributes to a diverse learning environment for students, faculty, and staff. A larger student population provides financial benefits that enable the University to invest in quality education, research, and student support services.

#### **International Enrolment**

UPEI has a growing reputation as a premier educational destination for students from around the world. The campus welcomes more than 2,000 international students from more than 90 countries each year, representing about 35 per cent of the entire student body.

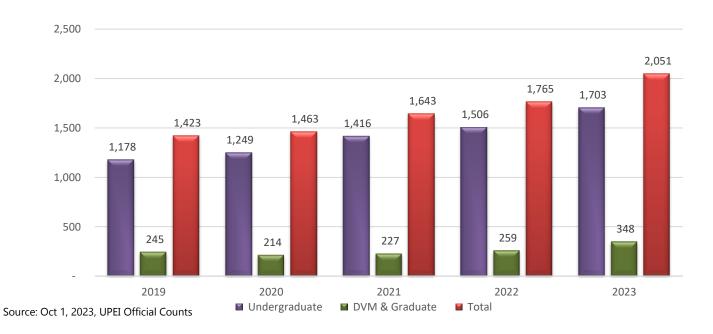
UPEI's international enrolment has grown by 16.2 per cent compared to last year. Over the past 5 years, the University has seen a 44.1 per cent increase in international students (Chart 6). With the uncertainty surrounding the recently announced federal



international student limits, the University has conservatively budgeted for international tuition in 2024-25.

#### **Tuition and Fees**

UPEI significantly depends on tuition and fee income to maintain a balanced operating budget, which constitutes approximately 35.8 per cent of its annual operating revenue. UPEI thoughtfully weighs the need for additional revenue against keeping tuition affordable for students when considering tuition rate increases. Thanks to provincial government support UPEI will receive in 2024-25, the University can uphold its pledge to affordable tuition. The University plans to implement a five per cent increase across all programs while maintaining its position as having the lowest undergraduate tuition rates among its counterparts in the Maritime Provinces (Chart 7).

This budget includes the following increases as well as certain fee changes. The complete listing of Tuition and Fees can be found in Appendix A.

 International fee increase: 5% or \$40 per course

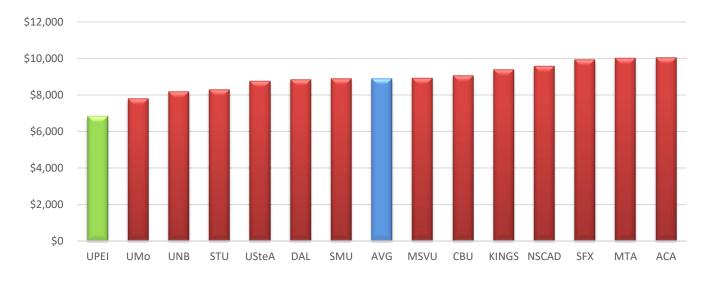

#### **Other Revenue**

#### **Ancillary Enterprises**

Ancillary enterprises serve as a significant resource for the University, providing crucial services to students and the broader University community. The residences, conference services, bookstore, and parking all play a substantial role in contributing to the University's annual operating budget. Residences and conference services constitute approximately 86 per cent of the ancillary enterprises' revenue. The 2024-25 fiscal year marks the second year of operation for the new Performing Arts Centre and Residence, which continues to be a key revenue source for the unit.

#### Sales and Services

The University relies on sales revenues to facilitate its operations, with the Veterinary Teaching Hospital (VTH), Diagnostics Services, and Animal Resources at the Atlantic Veterinary College serving as major contributors. These revenues are instrumental in supporting the faculty's educational objectives.

The VTH services small and large animal patients in the hospital and large animal patients through field services. The VTH is a multi-disciplinary specialty referral hospital. Primary care and specialty services work with each other and in conjunction with the diagnostic laboratory, to ensure that animals have access to all options for specialty care, diagnostic testing and treatment. The VTH and Diagnostic services account for approximately 77 per cent of the activity for the University's total sales and service revenue budget.

The VTH is passionate about its goal to provide an outstanding level of health care for its animal patients while also providing clinical teaching and instruction to our senior (final year) Doctor of Veterinary Medicine students, interns and residents.

The revenues from ancillary enterprises and sales and service constitute approximately 17.5 per cent of the University's operating budget income.





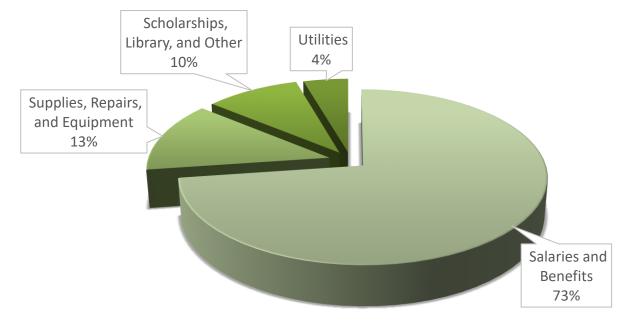
### **Operating Expenditures**

The faculty and staff of UPEI play a pivotal role in achieving the institution's objectives and are integral to the successful operation of any university. This is evident in the substantial allocation (73 per cent) of the operating budget for salaries and benefits. Other significant expenditures encompass utilities, departmental supplies, equipment, debt financing, scholarships, and library resources.

#### **Expenses**

The University's operating expenditures capture the costs relating to all faculties and service units within the University.

#### **Salaries and Benefits**

• Salaries and benefits are the most significant component of the UPEI expenditure budget. The budget planning process includes estimating career progression increments, cost of living adjustments, and increasing benefit costs. As salaries and benefits amount to 73 per cent of all operating expenditures, this is a crucial area of focus in the budget development process. Salaries and benefits include contracted staff members for secondments and institutional partnerships.

#### **Supplies and Other Expenditures**

• The University uses supplies in many areas of its operations. The most significant areas of expenditure are in support of the revenue generating units, such as ancillary enterprises and the Veterinary Teaching Hospital. Supplies are also used to support the academic and administrative units of the University. Other expenditures include but are not limited to scholarships, travel, and research support. These expenditures are all in support of the academic mission of the University.

#### **Repairs and Maintenance**

• The University receives restricted funding to support a portion of the annual repairs and maintenance costs for the campus, however, deferred maintenance costs of an aging infrastructure continue to put pressure on the University Operating Budget. To address this challenge, the University has allocated additional budget resources for the 2024-25 fiscal year.

#### **Equipment, Debt Financing, and Internal Financing**

- Most of the University's external debt is financed by distinct capital grants from the PEI Government.
  However, there are exceptions such as the debt incurred for residence construction and renovation, which is covered by the operating revenues of the residence, and the debt associated with the AVC expansion.
- In addition to residence and AVC long-term debt, the operating budget includes capital expenditures for equipment and equipment financing.

#### **Utilities**

• Utilities play a crucial role in financial planning, accounting for approximately 4 per cent of the annual operating budget. The Facilities Management division adheres to the University Sustainability Policy, regulating temperature settings for heating and cooling based on the season and occupancy levels.
