3. Business Arising

President Abd-El-Aziz reported to senators that a joint degree in Global Affairs is being established with the King Juan Carlos University in Madrid, Spain. The President noted that he travelled to Spain recently along with Larry Hammell, Associate Dean of Graduate Studies and Research; Donna Sutton, Registrar; and Doreley Coll, Faculty of Arts. We will be offering 5 courses here from September to December, and they will offer 6 courses plus a practicum which will occur in Madrid, Strasburg and Geneva. Because they are delivering 2/3 of the program, the student records will be with the University in Madrid. All our marks will be forwarded to them, and both universities will be there to present the certificate when the students graduate. The intake of students will involve a minimum of 12 students to a maximum of 25. There are a

great number of students interested in this program already. President Abd-El-Aziz informed Senators that the President of King Juan Carlos University will be here the end of April and will be investigating other possible partnership opportunities. The President thanked the Senate and the Board of Governors for their support of exploring and establishing this degree opportunity with King Juan Carlos University.

4. <u>President's Report</u>

President Abd-El-Aziz reported that the Canadian Mental Health Association(CMHA)- PEI Division, Cows Creamery, and UPEI participated in an ice cream social event which raised money for the CMHA – PEI Division in memory of Jason Driscoll. Jason was an Engineering student who took his own life in 2017. A large number of faculty, staff and students participated in the event.

The President also informed Senators that programs in Engineering, Business and Math & Computational Sciences will be beginning in September at the University of Canada in Egypt. He stated he was very grateful that the Senate and Board have supported this initiative. Dr. Robert Gilmour, Vice President Academic and Research will be going to Egypt in two weeks to deal with the logistics of the program. He will provide an update to senate at the next meeting.

President Abd-El-Aziz reminded Senators that the recent Federal Budget favors supporting research at universities, and he expects the Provincial Budget will be available within the next two weeks.

Through a variety of children's and young adult texts, students will trace the history of censorship in children's book publishing; examine how definitions of childhood and children's literature have evolved over time and across cultures; and discover how parents, publishers, schools, and libraries handle challenges in practice. The course traces assumptions – both historical and personal about what reading is appropriate for children and young adults.

Rationale for New Course: English 2450, the Introduction to Children's Literature course now offered in the Department, is very popular; each year, the course fills, and there is often a waiting list, even when two sections are offered. In 2015, a member of the English Department offered this new course as a 4000-level seminar, and it both filled and was a successful pilot. Offering this course in rotation with 3450 will allow students interested in children's literature – prospective teachers and librarians in particular – the chance to follow up on the work of the 2000-level course and explore important issues in contemporary culture: the limits on speech and writing, censorship, and the nature of childhood and writing for children.
